Consideration and possible action to reject the lowest bid received to complete the City of Fallon Electrical Service and Generator project (PWP# CH2021-396), submitted by A&K Earthmovers of Fallon, Nevada, in the amount of Five Hundred Sixty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$567,000), in order to serve the public interest pursuant to NRS 338.143.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd introduced the possible action to reject the lowest bid received to complete the City of Fallon Electrical Service and Generator project (PWP# CH2021-396), submitted by A&K Earthmovers of Fallon, Nevada, in the amount of Five Hundred Sixty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$567,000), in order to serve the public interest pursuant to NRS 338.143. Pursuant to NRS 338.143, the City Council may reject any bids received if the City Council determines that the public interest would be served by such a rejection. With the lowest bid so greatly over the attached engineer's estimates, it is the recommendation of staff that the City Council reject the bid in order to serve the public's interest. The rejection will allow City staff to undertake further efforts to reduce the complexity and cost of the project and to re-advertise for bids to complete the simplified project. Preliminary construction costs were estimated at \$323,863. As advertised, the project generally included: Demolition and removal of the existing City Hall generator, placement of a new 250kw generator, the construction of a generator enclosure and the installation of underground conductor to 98 South Carson Street, the Douglass House, and City Hall. Once completed, the newly installed 250kw generator will allow for temporary power to be delivered to City Hall, the Douglass House and 98 South Carson during an interruption of utility power. Currently, the existing City Hall generator is undersized for the facility and only allows for a portion of the building to be energized during an outage. The project was released for public bid on November 10, 2021 and advertised in Lahontan Valley News in accordance with NRS 338.135. A pre-bid meeting was held on November 30, 2021. One bid was received and publicly opened by the City of Fallon on December 16, 2021. We really hit a perfect storm on this project, with material prices, labor shortage, and transportation issues. With only receiving one bid on the project, it probably wasn't overly competitive and so as the agenda request stated, the staff's recommendation is to reject this bid and put it back out in March or April. We are not under huge time restraints and the current generator at City Hall is antiquated but it runs efficiently, and we maintain it well. The biggest problem is, like the request said, is that only a portion of City Hall is energized during an outage. It is a very important project for the city, and we are excited to get all three buildings fully operational and have it as a center, especially in a prolonged outage.

Mayor Tedford said that sometimes we get a low bid, and the low bid is fine, but it isn't this time.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that per-pandemic copper prices were trading at \$2.00 per pound and hit an all-time high this year at almost \$5.00 per pound. Copper prices are historically a good indicator of a strong economy.

Councilman Richardson asked if we would be getting a new estimate from the engineer

because we obviously need to reflect what the market price for materials are.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that we will revisit this in the next couple of months and come back to the Mayor with the results.

Councilwoman Kent commented that with the supply chain issues and prices, it is a gamble, but that she thinks it is a good decision.



Public hearing for Bill Nos. 788, 789, and 790: Ordinances amending Title 2, Chapter 2.20, Sections 2.20.020, 2.20.030, and 2.20.050 of the City of Fallon Municipal Code for the purpose of changing the dates of primary and general City elections, requirements for primary election candidates, and commencement of office for elected officers following general City election; and for other matters properly related thereto.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that he spoke with the Mayor yesterday for the public hearing and thought he would open it up for public comment. The bills that are before you are amending Fallon's Municipal Code relative to its timing of its primary and general elections and are very thorough. He commended Mr. deBraga on the thoroughness and they speak for themselves as to what is being done, procedurally, by each of these bills. At this time, unless there are no public comments, we will move on to Council's discussion over on the next agenda item to further answer any questions that the Council has and then we can further discuss, if necessary.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost inquired if there were any public comments. No public comments were noted.

Consideration and possible adoption for Bill Nos. 788, 789, and 790: Ordinances amending Title 2, Chapter 2.20, Sections 2.20.020, 2.20.030, and 2.20.050 of the City of Fallon Municipal Code for the purpose of changing the dates of the primary and general City elections, requirements for primary election candidates, and commencement of office for elected officers following general City election; and for other matters properly related thereto.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe mentioned that Bill No. 788 addresses the timing of the primary election. Back in 2019, the Legislature adopted AB50 which made several changes and amendments to NRS Chapter 293 and then some correspondent changes in 293C, which is directed primarily at City elections. One of the amendments in the NRS was to change the timing of the primary elections. This changed the primaries from the first Monday in April to the second Tuesday in June, which coincided with the rest of the elections in the State of Nevada. This Bill simply changes the timing of our primary, to correspond with that of the County. Bill No. 789 makes some changes to the primary election to the timing of when persons must declare their candidacy for open seats in the City. This changes it from 60 to 70 days prior to the primary to the first Monday in March through 5:00 p.m. of the second Friday in March. Again, this is just to correspond and be similar to what the County and other Counties must file for. Bill 790 is the time for the general election which is for the Mayor and the Council member requirements. Again, this largely changes the timing of these races. There are some minor changes to what occurs as far as when people are declared elected but there are not subsistent changes, other than

procedural.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost commented that if you will remember, the Nevada Legislature required us to change our elections from odd numbered years to the even numbered years, so this cleans up our ordinances and our municipal code to comply with those NRS changes.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost inquired if there were any public comments.

No Comments were noted.

Councilman Richardson motioned to adopt Bill Nos. 788, 789, and 790: Ordinances amending Title 2, Chapter 2.20, Sections 2.20.020, 2.20.030, and 2.20.050 of the Fallon Municipal Code for the purpose of changing the dates of primary and general City elections, requirements for primary election candidates, and commencement of office for elected officers following general City election; and for other matters properly related thereto; Councilwoman Kent seconded the motion; the motion carried on a 3-0 vote by the Fallon City Council.

Public Hearing for Bill No. 791: An ordinance amending Title 2, Chapter 2.40, Section 2.40.020, of the City of Fallon Municipal Code for the purpose of changing the appointment dates of appointive officers; and for other matters properly related thereto.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that there was no public comment on Bill No. 791 when introduced at the Council's properly notice special meeting on January 28, 2022. Notice of the deposit of copies of the proposed ordinance and the public hearing date was duly published in the Lahontan Valley News on February 2, 2022. The proposed ordinance, as introduced, and Proof and Statement of Publication of the Notice of Deposit of Copies and Public Hearing to Adopt Bill No. 791 are attached to this coversheet. This agenda item represents the public's opportunity to comment on the proposed ordinance and to present relevant information and materials to the Council.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost inquired if there were any public comments.

No Comments were noted.

Consideration and possible adoption of Bill No. 791: An ordinance amending Title 2, Chapter 2.40, Section 2.40.020, of the City of Fallon Municipal Code for the purpose of changing the appointment dates of appointive officers; and for other matters properly related thereto.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that Bill No.791 makes similar corresponding changes to the appointment of appointive officers in the City to correspond with the terms in office that have shifted because of AB50, as discussed on the last agenda item. This, again, makes a change to the timing of appointment of officers after the Council is newly taking office, every two years because of the way the election staggers the Council races. Following that, taking office by the Council, the Mayor will bring the appointive officers before the Council for approval. This is just a change in the timing and the code to correspond with what was enacted by the Legislature.

Councilwoman Kent asked when the council people will take office if they are elected in November.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that they will take office in January. In the ordinances we just changed, they take office at the first regularly scheduled meeting in January, of the year, following the elections.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost inquired if there were any public comments.

No comments were noted.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to adopt Bill No. 791: An ordinance amending Title 2, Chapter 2.40, Section 2.40.020, of the City of Fallon Municipal Code for the purpose of changing the appointment dates of appointive officers; and for other matters properly related thereto; Councilman Richardson seconded the motion; the motion carried on a 3-0 vote by the Fallon City Council.

#### Fallon Police Department Monthly Report for January 2022

Chief Kris Alexander greeted the council. He stated that on page 1 of the report, there were calls for service and 794 in January which is down substantially from 1,273 in December. There were a few less business checks. The reason that it was at 1,273 in December is because we had far more business checks which compiled a lot more calls for service. Crime Summary, larceny, or petty thefts, if you will, they remain our highest category at 10 and I will break those down a little bit further in the report. We had four calls of domestic battery, and six calls of simple battery and assaults. Arrest Summary for the month of January, we had a 35 total arrests, and again, I will break those down in detail, a little further in the report. Moving citations and warnings were down this month from previous months. Sixty-nine total warnings were issued along with 34 citations. Traffic accidents have been a little higher than average this last month, with 18 total public property accidents and 3 total private property accidents. Animal shelter numbers have remained the same over the last several months. These ebb and flow but generally, the numbers remain steady. The Citizens surveys, again, had disappointing responses. We are trying to develop something a little bit easier for people to access and make them easier to fill out. Simply, six results are not enough, and it doesn't give a good sample from the citizens. We are trying to develop something on our Facebook page while keeping anonymity so people who are hesitant to criticize the Police Department, can feel free to do that, if they have negative comments to make. Anonymity is key and we are trying to figure out a simpler way for people to access some surveys. Regarding the citizens comments, they were all positive or satisfied. The first one at the top mentions the elderly neighbors with dementia and they appreciated the officer's kind and prompt response. We had a female, that unfortunately, her dog ate some rat poison, she called the City of Fallon dispatch. Kayla Norcutt, from Animal Control, responded and her dog Barnaby, made it through just fine. He continued reading, "every time I've had to call or interact with Fallon PD, it is positive". "I was treated respectfully, efficiently and quickly". "We are fortunate to live here in Fallon". The last one, we had a gentleman respond. He was referring to a call from six months ago and complaining, so once we navigated through that, he was still satisfied with the Fallon Police Department service, and we did reach back out to him and address the issues from this last summer. Activities and Special Events, we provided lodging to one person in the month of January. There was no indoctrination training at NAS Fallon. Volunteers in Police Services volunteered eighty-three (83) hours to the agency, including Helping Hands, Domestic Violence Meetings, and a project for our department meeting. On January 14th, Officer Jacobs, School Resource Officer, passed out lunches to students at Lahontan Elementary School. The Breakdown of Arrests includes of the five (5) felony arrests, three (3) of the arrests were on felony warrants and two (2) were on Parole and Probations violations. Of the total sixteen (16) misdemeanor arrests, eleven (11) were misdemeanor warrant arrests. Theft report breakdown is as follows: One (1) report for stolen tires, two (2) reports of siphoned gas, one (1) report of a stolen casino ticket, two (2) reports of stolen packages, one (1) report of a stolen scooter, one (1) report of stolen license plates, one (1) report of theft from Walmart, and one (1) report of theft of food from Golden Gate gas.

Councilman Richardson said that he wanted to put on record that we received a positive correspondence from Mr. Richard Gent, Executive Director, commending Chief Alexander and his staff for the training that they shared.

Chief Alexander commented that Mr. Gent puts on a very good presentation.

Councilwoman Frost asked if the Explorer program was up and active.

Chief Alexander replied, that due to Covid-19, they have put a back-seat to the program because they don't want to expose them at the City level as well as at the School District level. They are going to try and get it revamped and up and running now that the mask mandates have been rescinded.

#### **Public Comments**

Mayor Pro Tem Frost inquired if there were any public comments. She noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. No action may be taken on a matter raised under this item until the matter has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action will be taken.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that Deb Bullock started today as the new Public Works Administrator. This is her first week and we are incredibly excited to have her and looking forward to Public Works operation running a little more efficiently. Very happy to have her.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost thanked Public Works Director Brian Byrd and welcomed Deb Bullock.

City Attorney Mike Mackedon stated that he has been the City Attorney for quite some time and during the entire time, going back to when Bob Erickson was Mayor, and the Mayor was a Councilman. During these times I don't remember a time when Ken has ever missed a meeting or even been late. So, I am assuming that there are very good reasons why he isn't here and why he isn't in that chair. Thank you.

Mayor Pro Tem Frost thanked Mike.

No further comments were made.

#### Council and Staff Reports

Mayor Pro Tem Frost inquired if there were any Council or staff reports. No comments were noted.

#### **Executive Session**

Mayor Pro Tem Frost tabled the executive session, as it was not needed at this time.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Tedford at 9:00 a.m.

Mayor Tedford led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Tedford inquired if the agenda had been posted in compliance with NRS requirements.

Deputy City Clerk Elsie Lee advised that the agenda was posted in compliance with the NRS requirements.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments. He noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. No action may be taken on a matter raised under this item until the matter has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action will be taken.

No comments were noted.

#### **Approval of Warrants:**

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve the accounts payable, payroll and customer deposit warrants; seconded by Councilman Richardson and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval of a Professional Services Contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the Wastewater Treatment Plant Dewatering Press project in the amount of Eight Hundred Twelve Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$812,600.00)

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that the City staff has been working to evaluate potential solutions for the treatment and disposal of biosolids generated from our processes at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The Wastewater Treatment Plant was originally designed to separate biosolids from the digester, and in turn discharge the biosolids into three separate lagoons on the east side of the facility. In response to an under designed digester, the quantity of biosolids generated has been much greater than originally anticipated. The increased quantity of biosolids has made the eastern lagoons unmanageable as their capacity rapidly diminishes. With the Nevada Department of Environmental Protection enforcing a more rigorous standard for lagoon maintenance, simply cleaning the lagoons, and repeating the same process would be cost prohibitive. The Nevada Department of Environmental Protection is requiring a mitigation plan to address the existing biosolids currently stored in the lagoons. The proposed volute press would separate the solids from the digested sludge through a dewatering process, while eliminating any future need for biosolid storage in the eastern lagoons. The contract being considered would allow for J-U-B Engineers to evaluate the installation of the new press and supply construction management services during the construction phase.

Mayor Tedford said that they are very excited about this project. He said that no one gets excited about the sewer system unless it is not working. This is a really important project for the City and it's one you don't like to have to spend this kind of money on but just to clean those ponds, it is between \$750,000.00 and \$1,000,000.00 project. So, when you do the screw press or this project alone, it is of great value to us by eliminating storage in those lagoons. It's not a subject, like when you go to a meet and greet, or one of these functions that we have around the community, that people ask, "How are you doing on the sewer project?" but it is an important project to us.

Councilwoman Frost said that this is the first step in setting this up. What is the goal and timeline of completion of the entire project?

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that this is going to be a complicated design, for sure, just because we must install new piping structure at the Wastewater Treatment Plant, construct a metal building that can hold it with a conveyor belt system. There are quite a few logistics to work through so it will take a majority of the year to get through that process. I anticipate breaking ground early Spring, 2023.

Mayor Tedford stated that we might come back to Brian and ask to add an SBR to this plant too. We are still in discussions, internally, and discussions with JUB about adding another SBR to the Plant. It is not in this project, it is separate, to add for future growth. The SBR is the Sequential Batch Reactor, that we have three (3) of already out there now. We have not come to

a decision, internally yet.

Councilwoman Frost addressed Mr. Byrd about other communities using this similar process and having success with it.

Deputy Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that that is correct. We are beneficiaries of that also, because our landfill can receive, what we call, the cake, which is the byproduct of this process. Currently, the best way to describe the other product is, sludge. The sludge gets pumped out to the lagoon and this dewatering process extracts so much water that it becomes like a play-doh consistency and can be put on a conveyor belt and put directly into a roll off and then hauled to the landfill. Our landfill can receive that from communities all around Northern Nevada and California. We are on contract with one of them and a lot of pricing inquiries on receiving that material. It is very easy to handle at the landfill and we hardly ever must touch it and it works out great.

Mayor Tedford said that the last time we cleaned those ponds, we really had a hard time getting a bid and it was a mess. This is a real step ahead and what the Nevada EPA would like us to do. There are some things that we have been able to do out there with the ponds over the years that we are not allowed to do anymore.

Deputy Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that the staff recommendation would be to save two of the ponds on the east side for maintenance or catastrophic events at the plant, so we always have some capacity to revert back to our previous operation.

Mayor Tedford said that that would be an internal discussion whether they would need two ponds or just one.

Councilwoman Kent asked if the new press would produce a different type of sludge and be able to clean up all three lagoons, over time

Mayor Tedford said that the new press doesn't clean the ponds.

Councilwoman Kent asked how the ponds get cleaned.

Mayor Tedford said that there is another process to clean the ponds. We may come back at some point with the contract to clean the ponds as well.

Councilwoman Frost said that this is going to be a great project for the city and moved to approve a Professional Services Contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the Wastewater Treatment Plant Dewatering Press project in the amount of Eight Hundred Twelve Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$812,600.00); Councilwoman Kent seconded the motion; the motion carried on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval of a professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the A Street Reconstruction project in the amount of One Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$135,250.00).

Deputy Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that the approval of a contract to Lumos & Associates would allow for design, planning, engineering, and construction services associated with the reconstruction for 2,500 linear feet of A street from Venturacci Lane to North Maine. The Scope of Work for this project includes topographic surveying, geotechnical investigation, agency coordination, preparation of construction documents, bid services, construction management, inspection, and quality assurance testing. City staff recommends an approval of a Professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. Last fall, we approved a contract with Sierra Nevada Construction for a heavier crack seal, slurry seal, chip seal and then another seal on top of that. When we came out of winter, we realized that A Street

probably was no longer a candidate for that application and that we really, most likely, need to focus our efforts on a full reconstruction there. So, after speaking with Lumos and Associates and Sierra Nevada, we were able to take those 2,500 linear feet that we had, for that which was already approved, and reallocate that to another City street. It is yet to be determined and then we can focus strictly on the reconstruction of A Street.

Councilwoman Frost mentioned that she gets questions about this all the time.

Mayor Tedford said that they will fix the sidewalks and put in the sidewalks that are not there also.

Councilwoman Frost motioned to approve the professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the A Street Reconstruction project in the amount of One Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$135,250.00); Councilman Richardson seconded the motion; the motion carried on a 3-0 vote by Council.

Consideration and possible appointment of Eide Bailly as auditors for the City of Fallon for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, for an estimated total fee not to exceed Ninety-Four Thousand Dollars (\$94,000.00), and approval for the mayor to authorize additional fees if necessary to complete the audit.

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson read, pursuant to NRS 354.624, the City must provide for an annual audit of all its financial statements. NRS 354.624 (3) requires the City to designate its auditors and provide notice of the designation to the Department of Taxation no later than tree (3) months before the close of the fiscal year to be audited. The Audit Committee which consists of Councilwoman Karla Kent, City Attorney Mike Mackedon, and me as Chief of Staff, have reviewed the attached proposal, and recommends the appointment of Eide Bailly as auditors for the City of Fallon for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022. The quoted total fee covers the general audit and one major program audit in addition to all travel costs.

Councilwoman Frost mentioned that is a very similar contract that we had in 2021 and asked if that was correct.

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson said yes, and that there are not major changes in the contract. We have contracted with Eide Bailly for approximately five (5) years now and then the previous company, which they merged with, our relationship goes back to the late 1940's. We have had a long-standing relationship with these guys, and they do an outstanding job.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve the appointment of Eide Bailly as auditors for the City of Fallon for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, for an estimated total fee not to exceed Ninety-Four Thousand Dollars (\$94,000.00), and approval for the mayor to authorize additional fees if necessary to complete the audit; Councilwoman Frost seconded the motion; the motion carried on a 3-0 vote by the Fallon City Council.

#### Fallon Police Department Monthly Report for February 2022

Chief Kris Alexander greeted the Council. He started with total calls for service in February being 636, staying on average for last February, which was 613. These were down from the previous two months. Page 2 of the report, the Crime Summary, there were five (5) for Domestic Battery, five (5) Battery Assaults, and pointed out that three (3) of those arrests were juvenile arrests, handled by the School Resource Officers at the School District.

We had twenty-three (23) total arrests for February of 2022, again, twenty (20) were adults and three (3) were juveniles. We issued twenty-two (22) citations last month and ninetyfour (94) warnings. The Animal Shelter Service is maintaining the average for the last several months, taking in fifty-three (53) City dogs, thirty-one (31) County dogs and no dogs from the Tribal entities. We received thirteen (13) Police Department Citizen Survey Results. They all were either Very Satisfied or Satisfied. The specific officers named were me, Capt. John Frandsen & Capt. Wenger, Sgt. Shyne & Babiarz, Officer Montgomery and Officer Mike Woolf, who is one of our new officers from the White Pine County Sheriff's Office, mentioned twice, and Officer Itskin. Dispatcher Kim Kufalk was also mentioned twice. On the next page is the Fallon Police Department Citizen Comments and all were positive. On the 6th comment, it says, "Thank you for responding to the ongoing homeless problem behind my house. The car is still there with a man inside. This situation creates a concern for our safety. If something isn't done, there will be a full-blown homeless camp again." We are currently addressing that issue with this specific person who is living in this vehicle. Activities and Special Events, we were able to provide lodging for two people in the month of February. During February, we also provided two separate trainings at NAS Fallon for indoctrination to new sailors. Our Volunteers in Police Services volunteered ninety-two (92) hours to the agency. These duties included Helping Hands, Domestic Violence Meetings, homeless count, and abandoned vehicle count. Officer Cruz and Officer Bloomfield answered questions for students at Agape Christian School. On February 28th, Officer Zamora provided a tour of City Hall to the Boys Scouts of America. Of the three (3) felony arrests, two (2) of the arrest were on felony warrants. Of the total nine (9) misdemeanor arrests, all nine (9) were misdemeanor warrant arrests. During the month of February, the Fallon Police Department took ten (10) theft reports, four (4) of the ten (10) were from retail establishments and the remaining six (6) were from individuals from around our community.

Councilwoman Frost asked the Chief about the ten (10) theft reports and how successful they are in solving those difficult cases.

Chief Alexander said that the retail thefts were a lot more successful because we have avenues to put pictures on the Facebook page and they have camera surveillance systems in the stores and that helps. Thefts from individuals are very tough as a lot of the items are tools and the items are not marked with individual markings or anything like that and it's tough to recover those items.

City Clerk Sean Richardson said that yes, higher is what he was going for and probably didn't use the best terminology. Before I send it over to the Department of Taxation, I can change that wording. I also plan to write a separate letter to the Department of Taxation. I can definitely change that verbiage to make it clearer.

You can feel good. I heard that from (inaudible) I have a picture of one from a year ago. You can feel good! You should repent and believe in me (inaudible) The people (inaudible) feel conviction. They feel that they're life is that you're a good person. But Christ (inaudible) the woman at the well (inaudible) identify that she couldn't find a husband and the one she was livin' with was not. Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that the City currently owns Churchill County Assessor's Parcel Number 001-556-14, commonly known as the Cottage Schools. The City and Churchill County staff have discussed the property swap whereby, the City will convey the Cottage School property to Churchill County, and Churchill County will convey 149 S. East Street and 310 Court Street, better known as the Senior Center, to the City. The County Commissioners approved the conveyance of the Old Senior Center to the City during the April 7, 2022, meeting. The County currently plans to use the Cottage School property for the C.A.R.E. (Churchill Aquatic Recreation Education) after school program. This transfer is authorized pursuant to NRS 277.053, which allows the governing body of a political subdivision to convey real property to any agency of the State or another political subdivision if the property is to be used for a public purpose. If approved, the Quitclaim Deed will be signed by the Mayor and recorded by the Churchill County Recorder, along with any other documentation necessary to complete the conveyance. The Quitclaim Deed contains a reversionary clause that provides that if Churchill County offers for sale or otherwise attempts to transfer title to a third party, that the title shall automatically revert to the City of Fallon.

# Fallon Police Department Monthly Report for March 2022. (For discussion only)

Chief Kris Alexander greeted the Council. Total calls for service in March were 678, staying on average for the last several months. Page 2 of the report, the Crime Summary, the Misdemeanor arrests were at seventeen (17) with nine (9) Juvenile Misdemeanor citations being issued. In March, officers issued one hundred eighteen (118) warnings for traffic violations and issued thirty-eight (38) citations. Animal control is always busy with dogs. They had forty-five (45) city dogs, fifty-five (55) county dogs and one (1) tribal dog. Return Citizen Surveys, we are very fortunate to have decent participation. We had thirteen

(13) turned in last month and all were very satisfied, with one (1) being satisfied. Citizen Comments can be seen in the packet, for you to review. I would like to point out that at the bottom of the page, 'the officer took no pictures or made comments on the accident. I would like to point out that it was a private property accident, and we do not take pictures of private property accidents. We just usually facilitate the accident and that is why no photographs were taken. Activities and Special Events, we provided zero (0) lodging for anybody last month. There was zero (0) indoctrination training for NAS Fallon. Our Volunteers in Police Services provided seventy-three and one half (73.5) hours to the agency. These duties included the Helping Hands. Sergeant Shyne and Officer Woolf provided traffic control for a fountain dye, Officer Jacobs answered questions for students at Lahontan Elementary School and Sergeant Decker had lunch with the children at St. John's Room to Grow. Breakdown of Arrest report shows three (3) felony arrests, two (2) of the arrests were Parole and Probation Violations. Of the seventeen (17) misdemeanor arrests, sixteen (16) were misdemeanor warrants. With the Breakdown of Theft Reports, we had the theft of a wallet, we had a retail theft from Big 5, retail theft from CVS, the report of a stolen package stolen off a porch from one of the local residences. There were three (3) catalytic converter thefts, a report of stolen art supplies, retail theft from Wal-Mart, and one (1) report of theft of gasoline. On the very last page is a report is the Volunteer Services Report.

Councilwoman Frost asked about the thefts of the catalytic converters and if they were all in one area.

Chief Alexander said that they were sporadic. The problem with catalytic converter thefts, as you have seen on the news, it is very popular, but it seems to be winding down. It is a very, very quick theft. We have two (2) on video, one at a local casino, and one at the County Road Department. It was less than a minute and a half from the time they executed the theft until the time they were finished. It was very rapid and very quick. I can't say in open session, but there is a specific vehicle that that they identified as one that can be easily removed, and they seem to be the most popular. It is very difficult to replace it, and their value is less than a hundred dollars. Most of the salvage yards don't take catalytic converters, or are more careful when they do because they are getting pretty hip to that.

Councilwoman Kent asked about the animal shelters and how many of those dogs get retrieved by their owners.

Chief Alexander said that he would have to get back to her on that. Facebook posts are very helpful in helping find the dogs owners.

That's sad. A week ago, Friday, I met the Superintendent, walking down to tell a parent that her child was in the administration building there, and she called her she and a person. She couldn't say daughter. She couldn't say that because she is (inaudible) the government (inaudible) system of communism and a (inaudible) system. But now, see, everything is gender neutral. (inaudible) the Superintendent, (inaudible) Law Enforcement and sexualize our children. So, what I'm tryin' to say is that people are being influenced and not knowin' that God exists. It's sad. And look at the moral standards of our city and it sucks. (inaudible) put on your (inaudible) and Serpa Place people goin' shwoop! Right through it. People don't stop at stop signs. They tap their brakes, but they go right through it. And no one is being accountable because there is no moral absolutes anymore. We're seeing our nation go downhill from their children up to adults. Appointment and possible confirmation of Charlie Knittle as Judge Pro-Tem. (For Possible Action)

Mayor Tedford stated that Charlie Knittle is a third generation Nevadan whose family homesteaded in Churchill County in 1953. Born in 1984 to Charlie Sr. and Renie Knittle, he was raised on the family farm and graduated from Churchill County High School in 2003. Charlie enjoyed camping, hunting, and fishing with his family all over the state of Nevada and could also be found competing in area rodeos. After High School, Charlie worked jobs as a construction hand for A & K Earthmovers, a long line trapper, and obtained has his Class A Commercial Driver's License to haul hay for area farms. In 2005, Charlie was hired by the line crew at CC Communications and has been gainfully employed there for the past sixteen years. In conjunction with his employment for CC Communication, Charlie also enjoys custom farming with his family. Charlie chooses to volunteer a substantial amount of his time to organizations that help the community. For the past fourteen years, Charlie has served on the Fallon Churchill Volunteer Fire Department and has been promoted to the rank of Captain. He also serves on the Churchill County Federal Credit Union Board of Directors and enjoys organizing their annual Blood Drive. Charlie met his love, Amber seven years ago, and they have never looked back. Together they have two beautiful children, Berlynn, age nine (9), and Carsen, age five (5). The Knittle's spend much of their days supporting the kids through sports and have followed in the strong family tradition of camping and fishing. Charlie Knittle has a deep connection to Fallon and is looking forward to working hard for its residents. Mayor Tedford called Charlie to the front and spoke of the process they went through. He said that both Charlie and Jared went through a process of committee interviews with seven or eight people and were extensive. These people consisted of internal staff and Mayor Pro Tem Frost. After that process, they met with you all, individually, saying that this process has been a long, winding one for a lot of different reasons. When that suitability was determined, they explained how this Court works. This Court is the closest to the citizens that there is, and, in our opinion, it is a lay Court. Citizens come in, sometimes even representing themselves. The Judge must be very considerate of these people, as citizens, and handle them accordingly, without always having a lawyer there to represent them. AB424 was passed in the 2021 Legislature, which changed the shape of how the Judge Pro Tem will work in the City. We were very fortunate to have Bill Lawry as a Judge Pro Tem for many years when Judge Lister was on vacation, or at out-of-town conferences. AB424 requires a 48-hour arraignment in the State of Nevada. I think that bill was really aimed at the larger counties in our State. We have never really had a problem with it in our rural area. It started out as a 72-hour time period, and went to a 24-hour arraignment, and then settled in at 48-hour arraignments. It can be a particular problem in rural counties. If you arrest someone on a Thursday night, you have to be arraigned by Saturday morning and Friday night, they have to be arraigned by Sunday morning. It becomes more of a problem if the Judge happens to be out-of-town on a weekend. The plan we came up with was to not just have one Judge Pro Tem, but to have two, adding more flexibility for Judge Lister and also to the Judge Pro Tems. Judge Lawry left us to be the acting Undersheriff, at no pay. He is a great, great Judge Pro Tem who was very wise, and grew up in the community and served in law enforcement and understands the people of our community well and administered justice in a very fair way. We have been without a Judge Pro Tem, which has put a lot of pressure on the Judge. This is something we have needed to do for a long time. AB424 explains the reason we are doing two (2) Judge Pro Tems. With that background, I would open the questioning of the Council, if they have any, for Charlie, at this time. I offer a Mayoral appointment to the Council and then it is up to the Council to confirm that appointment. They certainly have the opportunity to do so at this time.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she served on the interview committee, and we already asked Charlie a lot of tough questions during that interview process. I think both of these

appointees truly understand the great responsibility and the temperament they need as a Judge Pro Tem. I am very happy that we found two great candidates to fill these positions.

No public comments were noted.

Mayor Tedford stated that he has spent two or three sessions with Charlie. I am very comfortable that he is going to be able to serve the citizens of Fallon in a very fair and judicial way. I have known Charlie for a long time. I told him that we had an incident years ago and I liked the way he handled the incident. I prevailed on the incident, but he handled his portion in a nice way and he might be sitting here even if he had prevailed, but chances are, he wouldn't have. I like critical thought, which defined by Webster, is careful analysis and judgement and I preach that around here and, in my life, to have critical thought and he really exercised it at that juncture, and I appreciated that in a young man. I don't have anything other than to offer my appointment to the Council and ask for your confirmation.

Councilwoman Frost motioned to confirm the appointment of Charlie Knittle as Judge Pro-Tem; seconded by Councilman Richardson; motion carried with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

# **Council and Staff Reports**

Deputy City Attorney Trent deBraga stated that the City of Fallon has received two requests from D.R. Horton. The first is to relinquish a ten (10) foot utility and drainage easement which was created by a September 1993 Parcel Map which was amended in December 1995. This particular request pertains to an easement that is located in the Diamond Creek Subdivision near Serpa Place and Coral Drive. The easement currently runs through about eight (8) lots which all, with the exception of one (1) are owned by D.R. Horton. City staff has discussed the easements internally and have concluded that the City of Fallon has no utilities located within the easement and because the City does not own these easements, we don't have to go through the formality required by NRS 278.480. Therefore, the City will be executing a relinquishment of easement, which will be recorded with the County. The other request from D.R. Horton pertains to ten (10) foot public utility easement created by a 2001 Parcel Map. The easement does lie within the portions of Lots 115, 116, and 117 of the North Gate Subdivision located near Keddie Street and Tamarack Court. These Lots are all owned by D.R. Horton as well and again, City staff did have an internal discussion and there was not

any utilities of the City of Fallon located within the easement. Therefore, since the easement is not owned by the City of Fallon, the formalities of NRS 278.480 are not required and we will be executing a quitclaim deed, a relinquishment of the easement, which will be recorded with the Recorders Office.

Councilwoman Frost asked if he had any knowledge of the original purpose of those easements.

Deputy City Attorney Trent deBraga said the one located near Serpa Place and Coral Drive, was created by a Parcel map, from the best we can tell, it's more speculation, the drainage easement had to do something with maybe where an old ditch used to lie. In general, they are just blanket utility easements that come with the parceling of property.

Mayor Tedford asked about the second one.

Deputy City Attorney Trent deBraga said that the second one had to do with the blanket public utility easement. From just looking at the maps, it looks like when the property was parceled, they just granted a standard, ten (10) foot utility easement, five (5) foot, on each side of the Lot line. But again, it had never been used by the City, so I think it was just a blanket public utility easement, which is common when there is a parceling of property.

# Fallon Police Department Monthly Report for April 2022. (For discussion only)

Chief Alexander commented that on page one (1) of the report, last month in April, we were at 620 calls for service, which is relatively similar to the last three (3) months. Page two (2), moving citations and traffic warnings for the month of April – we had fifty-

three (53) actual citations issued and one hundred thirty-six (136) warnings. You will notice for the last several months that we have had a definite increase from the graph above. I want to point out that the graph above was primarily Covid numbers and very minimal traffic contacts and interactions. Crime summary, of course, unfortunately, the highest two (2) categories is going to be domestic battery, as we had eight (8) last month as well as eight (8) larcenies. I will break out the larcenies on the last page of the report for you a little bit more specifically. There were four (4) felony arrests, eleven (11) misdemeanor arrests and unfortunately, this number is high because of the domestic violence. Animal Shelter numbers – we had thirty-nine (39) county dogs, we had fortyfour (44) city dogs and zero dogs taken in from the Tribal entities. I also wanted to point out and be a little more specific - I contacted TSO, Tony Burgess, our animal control supervisor, and I wanted to give you guys a list of the entities that we also work with our animal control; Humane Society of Northern Nevada, SPCA out of Reno, the group Rescue out of Reno, and Feline Rescue of Northern Nevada, FAWG and CAPS are all the entities that our animal control interacts with. Literally, well about 99.99% of our animal control call animals are adopted.

Councilwoman Frost complimented Animal Control on their Facebook page with getting those animals up there and posted and getting adopted out, it's effective.

Chief Alexander thanked her and said that everybody has a friend of a friend who knows who the dog belongs to, and it is very effective.

Councilwoman Frost said that it is very tempting as they have some border collie puppies right now.

Chief Alexander told Councilwoman Frost to go out there and adopt them. We will even bring them to you if that helps.

Chief Alexander said that there were six (6) private party accidents last month and nine (9) on public property. I would like to say that the construction business seems to be affecting accidents on Williams Avenue so, they seem to be doing alright there. There were thirteen (13) returned citizen surveys. All were, of course, very satisfied or satisfied. Specific officers that were mentioned in the Citizen surveys were, Sergeant Schumann, Officer Zamora, Officers Itskin, Beck, Atchison, and Officer Mike Woolf. Citizen survey comments, by far, always positive. Department Activities and Special Events had no lodging provided to anyone, two (2) indoctrinations trainings at NAS Fallon for two (2) separate groups of sailors to the Naval Air Station. Our Volunteers in Police Services provided ninety-five and one half (95.5) hours to the agency for the month of April. These hours include the Helping Hands, Domestic Violence Meetings, Prescription Drug take back, that took place on the 30th of April. They also have been helping with VIN inspections. We don't have a total poundage for the Prescriptions that we had taken back, however, there were 12 boxes, and each box was roughly three (3) feet tall and 18x18 wide. In other Public Relations, Officer Itskin provided a tour of the Police Department to juveniles, Sergeant Decker and Officers Groom and Montgomery provided traffic control during the Military Children /fountain dye ceremony. Officer Itskin taught bicycle safety to the Boys Scouts. Sergeant Babiarz, Detective Goodrick & VIP Goodson participated in the Prescription Round-up at CVS. The breakdown of the theft reports included a stolen wallet, firearm, stolen vard ornament, stolen air conditioner, stolen utilities, cash from a purse, retail theft Walmart and an illegal use of a dumpster.

Mayor Tedford asked what they were doing with that dumpster.

Chief Alexander said that it was illegal dumping, people who did not have the dumpster assigned to them or allowed to use it.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said yes.

Consideration and possible approval of a Professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the Court Street Reconstruction project in the amount of One Hundred Thirty-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$139,000.00). (For possible action)

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that the approval of a contract to Lumos & Associates would allow for design, planning, engineering, and construction services associated with the reconstruction of 750 linear feet of Court Street from Nevada Steet to East Street. The Scope of Work for this project would include, topographic surveying, geotechnical investigation, agency coordination, preparation of construction documents, bid services, construction management, inspection, and quality assurance testing. City Staff recommends approval of a Professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. It is estimated that the project costs will be around \$827,000.00 and if you remember back in 2021, the Council and the Mayor recommended this Court Street project to be our application through the Community Development Block Grant Process and we found out early this spring that they awarded \$405,000.00 towards that project which is another huge get for the City and is substantially larger than the majority of CDBG applications that they approve. Derek Zimney went out in early Spring and presented this project, and they thought the same thing, that you all did, and it was

beneficial to the economic development of that area and critically important. This is good news and hopefully we will have about half of that project cost to fund, once completed.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve a Professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the Court Street Reconstruction project in the amount of One Hundred Thirty-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$139,000.00); seconded by Councilman Richardson and carried with a 3-0 vote by the Fallon City Council.

Consideration and possible approval of a professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the Oats Park Splash Pad and Pavilions project in the amount of Ninety Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$90,950.00). (For possible action)

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that the City of Fallon intends to utilize approximately one-acre of Oats Park, north of the existing community swimming pool in order to provide the public with a splash park experience for water play activities. The splash pad will have a non-slip safety surface and various nozzles and playground like features that can shower, spray, rain, mist, and shoot streams of water. The splash site will allow access to the existing pool and facilities. The new splash park area will be fenced from the other portions of the park and have multiple new pavilions available by reservation. Lumos & Associates will assist the City in planning, developing and constructing the new facility through surveying, civil engineering, landscape architectural services, bid assistance and project management. In addition to the proposal for design, engineering, and construction management services, I feel it's worth noting that the City staff has put quite a few hours into going over the different features of splash pad construction, the operation of the splash pads, the maintenance, and where exactly this splash pad should be placed, within our community. In doing so, it became clear that Oats Park would be the ideal home and future home, for Fallon's first splash pad. By design, Oats Park is our hub for outdoor special events, from a park's standpoint. Between the stage, the ball fields, the pavilion, the large spaces, the outdoor pool, and its' location, Oats Park is really set up to handle large scale events that bring in larger crowds. Unlike Broadway, Pioneer, Laura Mills, and Burntwood Parks, in my opinion are more neighborhood parks that get utilized by a majority of folks that live in the vicinity of the area. Oats Park is on a different playing field, because of:

- 1. The ability for folks to park and the Mayor and the Council worked hard to expand the parking capacity there and those improvements we have made over the last few months and years have really helped alleviate some of the parking burden that folks would face.
- 2. I think a splash pad, very desired in our community, would bring in double the crowd that the outdoor pool currently brings in. Parking would be an issue if it was placed at any of the other parks. The infrastructure that currently exists at the outdoor pool, one of the largest costs in constructing these splash pads is the piping, the water filtration, the recirculation, and to have the outdoor pool already there and for them to already have bore the burden of a lot of those costs, it is just makes good business sense to place that splash pad directly to the north of the outdoor pool. I have talked a little bit about it in the summary that the splash pad would be tied into the outdoor pool area, but the vision, at the preliminary stages, but we see a fence going to the north of the outdoor pool that has an

access and egress into the pool and the splash pad is controlled through the outdoor pool area and it becomes connected. This allows us to access the splash pad much more efficiently. I anticipate the splash pad being open as the same time as the outdoor pool and would be able to man and staff that with lifeguards and be supervised by the Pool, Parks, and Gym Supervisor. Connecting those two facilities is very ideal, from an operational standpoint. I believe that this pretty much sums up our decision making and how we arrived at this location. As a dad of two children, in this community, I wish they were still a little bit younger so that they could really maximize it because, the outdoor pool is a jewel of this community the Council and the Mayor, you have an incredible job over the many decades of keeping it operational, but there is no opportunity for toddlers and midrange child to have water play activities without the fear of standing water. This time of year, when it heats up, you have seen how many people utilize that pool and this is going to offer an entire other option for these folks where they can bring their smaller children, set up birthday parties and it will be a great benefit to the community.

Councilwoman Frost asked of the non-slip surface and the life of that product.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that it was very similar to the higher end playground surfacing that is almost like a rubberized, permeable surface, porous surface where the water drains down through. I am not exactly sure on that, but I would assume that it is a ten-year life span, and then it would have to be replaced, especially with just the heat that we have here. There would be some maintenance costs in all of that, for sure.

Councilwoman Frost asked if we could put in special requests for certain play structures. I know my kids, when we have gone to other water parks, loved the little buckets that spill on you, the mushroom, that they can go in and out of under the water.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that we have had a few vendors supply renderings and I intentionally did not put any of that in the packet, just because there are so many options, and I didn't want to lead any body astray. Absolutely, those will be in there and there are endless possibilities.

Councilwoman Frost said that this will be a huge thing for kids in our community, and I know my kids, when we have traveled, they have loved that stuff.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that it is all very popular.

Councilwoman Frost said that our pool is becoming taxed and crowded, so having a splash pad would alleviate the crowding that we have in the pool.

Councilwoman Kent mentioned that I some constituents and neighbors approach me about the splash pad over at Laura Mills Park, just for things for kids to do over at that end of town. Also, have we thought of the magnitude that this is going to be and after learning and understanding the infrastructure, the parking, and everything that we do have at Oats Park, I just want to say that I concur with the decision to have it there.

Mayor Tedford said that he has four kids that grew up on that side of town and as you know, I served that Ward for eight (8) years and I don't think we have changed much in those years, since I was there, they just got on their bikes and went down Center Street to the pool. I believe that Brian makes some good points about Oats Park has just been built over the years – it is a magnet park because of its' immense size. Long before we started, they put ball parks there and bandstands there and the pool there, back in '39 so it's been built as a magnet park and a destination park. In this town, not much has changed and kids can still get on their bikes and ride to that park from almost anywhere because of where it is situated. Okay, I am going to tell you a story; One day, my kids said that they wanted to get on their bikes and ride to Laura Mills Park and I said, you can't do that because I watched too many of those Forensic Files and TV shows and I

thought, what am I talking about – You go get on your bikes and ride to Laura Mills Park and certainly, you can ride to Oats Park, you're not going to end up on a milk carton somewhere. I think that we are still that kind of a community and with the Police Department, that is quite good, that the kids can ride almost anywhere on their bikes and be safe. I am glad that we live in one like this and has a relatively low crime rate.

There were no further comments.

Councilwoman Frost moved to approve the professional Services Contract with Lumos and Associates, Inc. for design and construction administration support services relating to the Oats Park Splash Pad and Pavilions project in the amount of Ninety Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$90,950.00); seconded by Councilman Richardson and carried with a 3-0 vote.

Consideration and possible approval of a Professional Services Contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for engineering services associated with completing a Facilities Plan for the potential expansion of the Wastewater Treatment Plant in the amount One Hundred Ninety Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$190,200.00). (For possible action)

Public Works Director Brian Byrd, said that if the last one got you excited, this one is going to be good.

Mayor Tedford said that wastewater is always exciting.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that the City of Fallon owns and operates Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) that treats wastewater generated by the City and handles an annual average daily flow (AADF) of about 1.2 million gallons per day (MGD), while being rated at an AADF of 2.2 MGD. The plant's liquid treatment process consists of a headworks that includes coarse screening and grit removal, a three-train Sequencing Batch Reactor (SBR) process, and disinfection consisting of a chlorine contact tank. The existing WWTP, which has been in service for over 20 years, has served the City well but is now facing a handful of critical challenges. After 20 years of service, much of the equipment is nearing the end of its useful service life. Influent flow and loadings to the WWTP are increasing due to population growth and industrial dischargers. NDPES permit limits are becoming more stringent, as evidenced in the latest draft permit, and may require improved treatment. The proposed Scope of Services will result in a new Facility Plan that accomplishes the following objectives: Establishing projected flows and loads for a 20-year planning period. Documenting known permit requirements and identifying potential long-term permit issues. Evaluation of the existing plant unit processes and performance under current and projected conditions. Development of recommended improvements to maintain a proper level of service and comply with known and anticipated discharge limits while establishing a capital improvement plan for the next 20 years of service. City Staff recommends approval of a Professional Services Contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc.

Councilwoman Frost said that it is a good idea for us to have this plan on the shelf, ready to go, when available money is there.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said yes, that is certainly the plan. As that 1.2 creeps up with the unprecedented growth that we are facing right now, and we get closer to that 75% number, NDP actually triggers that we have a plan for expansion or improvement in place and to get in front of this and ahead of it, it definitely benefits the city.

Councilwoman Frost asked how many years do we have until we get to that 75% or is it months?

Public Works Director Brian Byrd said that this firm will do a very detailed analysis of that, and it is not months. The City of Fallon is in good shape and like I said, we are in front of the curve. We have a representative from J.U.B. Consulting back there and they recently have taken over our wastewater treatment plant consulting and I cannot speak highly enough of what they have done. They have been pushing us to get this done, just so that we stay in that driver's seat, and we never propose that 'months.'

There were no further questions or comments.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve a Professional Services Contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for engineering services associated with completing a Facilities Plan for the potential expansion of the Wastewater Treatment Plant in the amount One Hundred Ninety Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$190,200.00); seconded by Councilwoman Frost and carried on a 3-0 vote by the Fallon City Council

# Fallon Police Department Monthly Report for May 2022

Captain Ron Wenger read that there were no real spikes in Police Reports between this May and last May, everything is pretty much normal. Citizen surveys – we sent out fourteen (14) got back fourteen (14). Eleven (11) very satisfied, two (2) satisfied and one (1) with no opinion. The Volunteers in Police Service gave 75.5 hours, volunteered to the Police Department, which included Domestic Violence Meetings and VIN Inspections. For citizens assistance, we provided one (1) bus ticket in the month of May for a citizen to get their destination and one (1) indoctrination of NAS Fallon for the new sailors coming on board. That is pretty much, the highlights of the Police Report.

Councilwoman Frost said she noticed a little spike in accidents and asked if was due to the construction or otherwise.

Captain Ron Wenger said that he doesn't see the accident reports but thinks that the spike is, maybe what you see, is Private Property accidents from zero (0) last year to six (6) this year. Is that where you see the spike?

Councilwoman Frost said that she was looking at the Public Property from nine (9) in April up to sixteen (16) in May. I didn't know if people were having a problem with the construction.

Captain Ron Wenger said that they are not having a problem with the construction and hasn't heard of one accident being dispatched in the construction area.

Councilwoman Kent asked about the battery and assaults, which seems to have gone up.

Captain Ron Wenger said yes, they have gone up and I did some research this morning on the schools. This May, we had a spike in fights at the school, juvenile fights, one at the bowling alley, and several at the school. Last May, if you noticed, the spike is from May to May. I was told the schools were on a split schedule, due to the Covid protocol and so we weren't getting as many battery calls in May. That is what I am going to attest what this spike was due to. There were a large number of juvenile fights at the school.

Geoff Knell said it's goin' pretty quick. It's nice, huh? We're takin' care of a 93year-old woman here in the city and apparently, she had anxiety from what's goin' on in the world, and she wanted to go to the hospital. Possible Introduction of Bill No. 788: An Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulations," to add Chapter 5.56 entitled "Shopping Carts" which provides for the regulation of shopping carts within the City of Fallon; declares the presence of shopping carts to create a shopping cart retrieval procedure; provides for the retrieval and impounding by the City or its agents of shopping carts in certain situations.

Mayor Tedford stated that this agenda item is for possible introduction of the proposed ordinance only. If introduced, a public hearing on the proposed ordinance will be set in the next agenda item and no further action can or will be taken at this meeting. At the public hearing, which will be properly noticed and advertised, the City Council will take comment and then consider possible adoption of the ordinance as introduced or amended. You all know the reason why we are introducing this because of the proliferation of shopping carts throughout the City and the lack of cooperation, from those who are doing so, to help us stop that problem.

Councilwoman Frost introduced Bill No. 788 an Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulations," to add Chapter 5.56 entitled "Shopping Carts" which provides for the regulation of shopping carts within the City of Fallon; declares the presence of shopping carts to create a shopping cart retrieval procedure; provides for the retrieval and impounding by the City or its agents of shopping carts in certain situations.

Setting a public hearing date for Bill No. 788: An Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulations," to add Chapter 5.56 entitled "Shopping Carts" which provides for the regulation of shopping carts within the City of Fallon; declares the presence of shopping carts to create a shopping cart retrieval procedure; provides for the retrieval and impounding by the City or its agents of shopping carts in certain situations.

The Mayor stated that the public hearing date for Bill No. 788 An Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulation" as presented will be set for July 19, 2022, at 9:00 a.m.

Consideration and possible approval and adoption of Resolution No. 22-02: A resolution authorizing a temporary interfund loan from the Landfill Enterprise Fund to the Sanitation Enterprise Fund in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00), and other matters properly related thereto.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that the Sanitation Fund has experienced tight cash flows in the last several years. The Council authorized temporary interfund loans in a previous fiscal year to supplement this fund and it also had a rate change, effective November 2020. With this change, we also included that the rate would be adjusted based on the Consumer Price Index. That was also done July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021, and we are planning on looking at the Consumer Price Index to be adjusted again, July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022. With the rate increases, this fund was budgeted to have sufficient, positive cash flow to pay its Interfund Loan. However, emergency capital items were necessary to be purchased this past fiscal year due to a fire at the Transfer Station and heavy demand for roll-off bins, due to all the construction growth. The fire at the Transfer Station also created a loss of revenue, as we had to create temporary site, at a significantly discounted rate for the fiscal year. This interfund loan would not have been necessary if these extra unordinary events did not occur. City Staff fully anticipate for this loan to be paid off by June 30, 2023, and most likely even sooner.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any questions from the Council or public comment.

No comments were noted.

Councilwoman Karla Kent motioned to approve Resolution No. 22-02: A resolution authorizing a temporary interfund loan from the Landfill Enterprise Fund to the Sanitation Enterprise Fund in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00), and other matters properly related thereto; seconded by Councilman Richardson and approved on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval and adoption of Resolution No. 22-03: A resolution augmenting the fiscal year 2021-2022 budget of the General Fund in the amount of Two Million One Hundred Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$2,113,00.00), the Convention Center Fund in the amount of Sixty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000.00), the Convention & Tourism Authority Fund in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00), the Mayor's Youth Fund in the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) and other matters properly related thereto.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that this agenda item involves the augmentation of governmental funds. Annually, City staff estimates the actual expenditures by the end of the fiscal year, of all the governmental funds by function and compares it to the budget. In order to avoid a Note 2 violation in our audit, we have to be under budget by function, and that is why we look at everything by function. NRS 354.598-05 authorizes the City to augment a budget when anticipated resources actually available during a budget period exceed those estimated. In order to augment the City Council must adopt a resolution. The Council must publish notice of its intention to act on the resolution and must not take action until at least three (3) days after publication. The General Fund contains ad valorem taxes as a source of revenue which requires the publication of the notice. This was published in the LVN last Thursday in order to be in compliance with that requirement. Today, governmental funds included in the resolution, that City Staff is requesting augmentation is the General Fund, Convention Center Fund, Convention & Tourism Authority Fund, and Mayor's Youth Fund. The details of the revision of the budget are contained in the resolution and the forms as described by the Department of Taxation. If approved, I will be forwarding the augmentation authorization to the Department of Taxation. Once it is received by the Department of Taxation, the augmentation will go into effect.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any questions or comments from the Council or public.

Councilwoman Kent thanked Sean and Bob for going over agenda item #7 and #8 in great detail with her prior to the meeting.

No further comments were noted.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve Resolution No. 22-03: A resolution augmenting the fiscal year 2021-2022 budget of the General Fund in the amount of Two Million One Hundred Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$2,113,00.00), the Convention Center Fund in the amount of Sixty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000.00), the Convention & Tourism Authority Fund in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00), the Mayor's Youth Fund in the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) and other matters properly related thereto; seconded by Councilwoman Frost and approved on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval and adoption of Resolution No. 22-04: A resolution augmenting the fiscal year 2021-2022 budget of the Electric Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,400,000.00), the Water Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000), the Sewer Enterprise Fund in the among of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00), the Sanitation Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), the Data Processing Internal Service Fund in the amount of Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$85,000.00), the Public Works Internal Service Fund in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), and other matters properly related thereto.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that this agenda item involves the augmentation of Enterprise Funds and Internal Service Funds. City staff estimates the actual expenditures through end of fiscal year, and we are comparing it to the final budget. NRS 354.598-05 authorizes the City to augment a budget when anticipated resource available exceeds the budgeted amount. In addition, the City Council must adopt a resolution. As listed in Resolution 22-04, City staff is requesting augmentation in Electric Enterprise Fund, the Water Enterprise Fund, Sewer Enterprise Fund, Sanitation Enterprise Fund, Data Processing Internal Service Fund, and the Public Works Internal Service Fund. The details of the revision of the budget are contained in the Resolution and the forms from the Department of Taxation which is included in the agenda. If approved, I will be forwarding the Augmentation Authorization to the Department of Taxation.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any questions or comments from Council or the public.

No comments were noted.

Councilwoman Frost motioned to approve Resolution No. 22-04: A resolution augmenting the fiscal year 2021-2022 budget of the Electric Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,400,000.00), the Water Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000), the Sewer Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00), the Sanitation Enterprise Fund in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), the Data Processing Internal Service Fund in the amount of Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$85,000.00), the Public Works Internal Service Fund in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), and other matters properly related thereto; seconded by Councilman Richardson and approved on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval and adoption of Resolution No. 22-05: Adjustment of Allowance for Doubtful Accounts – Enterprise Funds' Accounts Receivables.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that City staff is constantly working on the collection of our Enterprise Funds, Accounts Receivables, in other words, billings. Like all businesses, there is always a few customers that we have collecting on. Attached to the agenda is a list of outstanding/delinquent ARs prior to July 1, 2020. So, almost 2 years old, at this point. These customers are no longer City of Fallon customers and have been forwarded to a collection agency for additional collection efforts. It doesn't mean that we are totally writing them off. They are sent to collections and whatever we are able to get from the collection agency will not be dollar for dollar, but there is still potential on

collecting on some of these accounts. The proposed adjustment of \$63,356.15 represents .3%. So, 3 tenths of 1% of the Enterprise Funds total operating record for the most recent fiscal year ending June 30, 2021. Essentially, we are collecting 99.7% of our billings, which is pretty good. The standard is .5% for our allowance that we have listed on our financial statement, we are well under that. If you look at the list, you will see almost half of it is related to an old landfill AR that occurred in 2018 and has been sitting on our Account Receivable books for a while. We have already accrued for that in the prior fiscal year. The expense has already been taken as bad debt. What we are asking for is an adjustment in our ledger of the Account Receivables to get off the books. Currently, at the Landfill, our allowance for doubtful accounts is the .5% plus this known bad debt that still reflects on the books. When this is written off, we would adjust it back to the .5% total revenues of the Landfill.

Mayor Tedford commented that Diversified Concrete is still there.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that this was discussed and believe that it is a totally different company. This company is an old vendor that I believe was contracted with the Navy. I don't believe that it is related to the local company.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any comments.

Councilwoman Karla Kent asked if the collection agency has good results for collecting bad debt.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that he doesn't know the actual nominal amount. I know that we do receive some collection.

Mayor Tedford stated that if these customers ever move back into the City, they are expected to pay these bills.

No further comments were noted.

Mayor Tedford stated that we could send the bill to Reno and see what happens.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve and adopt Resolution No. 22-05:

Adjustment of Allowance for Doubtful Accounts – Enterprise Funds' Accounts Receivables; seconded by Councilman Richardson and approved on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval and adoption of Resolution No. 22-06: A resolution to commit Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000.00) of the General Fund Ending Fund Balance ending June 30, 2022, for improvements to various City capital projects including street, park, airport, utility infrastructure, and other matters properly related thereto.

Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 54 (GASB 54) authorizes the City Council to commit General Fund Ending Fund Balance for various purposes. The City received grant funding from the State & Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) in July 2021. The large portion of the SLFRF was reported as loss of revenue in the General Fund. City staff plan on using these funds for various capital projects including street, park, airport, and utility infrastructure. City staff recommends putting constraints on the use of these funds by committing the fund balance for these purposes. I think this is good fiscal management policy that we put a constraint on this because we are planning on using this significant amount of money and it is one-time money for long-term benefits for our citizens. That is what putting this committed fund balance would be doing.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any questions from the Council or public.

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No comments were noted.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve and adopt Resolution No. 22-06: A resolution to commit Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000.00) of the General Fund Ending Fund Balance ending June 30, 2022, for improvements to various City capital projects including street, park, airport, utility infrastructure, and other matters properly related thereto; seconded by Councilwoman Frost and approved on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval and adoption of Resolution No. 22-07: A Resolution Permitting the City Attorney and the City Attorney's Deputies and/or Assistants to Defend Persons in Criminal Proceedings.

Deputy City Attorney Trent deBraga stated that Nevada Revised Statute 7.1052 permits a City Attorney under his or her deputies and assistants to defend a person in a criminal proceeding with or without compensation if certain criteria are met. Part of that criteria requires the approval or authority from the City Council or the government body. In addition, there is some criteria where before a City Attorney or their deputies can take on the criminal representation, they would have to get the approval of the defendant and the City Attorney, or the Deputy cannot defend a person in a criminal proceeding in the same jurisdiction in which they prosecute. This Resolution, if adopted, would allow the City Attorney and his/her deputy to defend persons in a criminal proceeding with the consent of the Council, the defendant, and if it is a Deputy City Attorney they would also have to get the approval of the City Attorney. The statute doesn't require the Mayor to authorize the representation of a criminal defendant. However, in this Resolution, we have added an additional layer of approval which would require the City Attorney and/or the Deputies obtain the Mayor's approval as well to represent a criminal defendant.

Councilwoman Frost inquired if the Council would be giving a blanket approval and then the Mayor will approve each individual case.

Deputy City Attorney Trent deBraga stated that was correct. Essentially, if this Resolution is adopted, the Council would be giving the approval to allow the City Attorney or Deputies to represent a defendant in a criminal proceeding. Additionally, it will require the Mayor's authorization and from the client's side of things it will require the defendant to give their consent as well.

Councilwoman Frost stated that if approved, the Council will not look at each individual situation. The approval would be given through the Resolution.

Deputy City Attorney stated that per this Resolution it is a general approval.

Councilwoman Frost inquired if the City Attorney would also have to abide by the Bar Association and their rules regarding conflicts of interest, or other conflicts that may arise.

Deputy City Attorney stated that absolutely with any representation that is always step 1. Is there any conflict? You always must abide and adhere to your ethical responsibilities and duties. So, yes that will certainly go into the consideration. That is usually, from the Attorney's side of thing, step 1 in the process. If you can't do it, you don't even begin the process of additional approval.

Councilwoman Frost thanked Deputy City Attorney deBraga.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any other questions or comments from the Council or public.

No further comments were noted.

Councilman Richardson motioned to approve and adopt Resolution No. 22-07: A Resolution Permitting the City Attorney and the City Attorney's Deputies and/or Assistants to Defend Persons in Criminal Proceedings; seconded by Councilwoman Kent and approved on a 3-0 vote by the Council.

#### **Public Comments**

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments. He noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. No action may be taken on a matter raised under this item until the matter has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action will be taken.

No comments were noted.

#### **Council and Staff Reports**

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any Council or staff reports.

There were no reports.

#### **Executive Session**

Mayor Tedford tabled the executive session, as it was not needed at this time.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Tedford at 9:00 a.m.

Mayor Tedford led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Tedford inquired if the agenda had been posted in compliance with NRS requirements.

Deputy City Clerk Elsie Lee advised that the agenda was posted in compliance with the NRS requirements.

#### **Public Comments**

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments. He noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. No action may be taken on a matter raised under this item until the matter has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action will be taken.

Mr. Geoff Knell of 261 Serpa Place stated that he spent 13 hours to get something done to save his pet. As I counted people in the City of Reno, I tell you, people know what's going on, but they are afraid to do something about it. The same right here in Churchill County. Afraid to do something about it. We could stop it; we could slow it down. I actually went to a church called the Potter House; it was off of there on South Virginia Street. We actually have one here too, they started it, but I am having a conflict with the minister there. They want to

save people, but they don't want to stand up against evil in this world. They let the children be manipulated and the public be manipulated. The churches are weak and non-combative effective, and they need to be rescued. So, you believe in trust in the Lord Jesus Christ, I hope you repent, and have the cojones to stand up against this evil because we are losing this nation because we're the last stronghold and we are becoming weak. Repent, and believe and trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. Thank you.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any other public comments. No further comments were noted.

#### **Approval of Warrants**

- A) Accounts Payable
- B) Payroll
- C) Customer Deposit

Councilwoman Frost motioned to approve the accounts payable, payroll and customer deposit warrants; seconded by Councilman Richardson and approved with a 2-0 vote by the Fallon City Council.

Consideration and possible action to approve the Sierra Manor Townhomes Merger and Re-subdivision Tract Map, subject to certain conditions, and authorizing the City Engineer to record the map upon satisfactory completion of the conditions.

Engineer Derek Zimney stated Farrokh Yazdi, owner of Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) 001-291-01, formerly known as the Childers Estates, has made application and presented a Merger and Re-subdivision Tract Map to convert the existing apartments into townhomes/condos. If approved, this map will subdivide the existing apartment complex into individual units, allowing the units to be sold individually as townhomes/condos. The existing apartments were constructed in the early 1970's and contain 30 living units. All units have been continuously served by City utilities since construction. The existing development meets the Fallon Municipal Code for multi-family housing and RC zoning. As a condition of approval, City staff has recommended certain conditions be met prior to the map being recorded. City Staff has compiled, and would like to recommend, the following conditions to be satisfied prior to the map being recorded. We are requesting that they provide a 3<sup>rd</sup> party building inspection and safety report for each unit and address live fire safety hazards, replace the driveway on Center Street to meet City and ADA standards, there is a concrete section of sidewalk there. They need to repave the alley between Whitaker and Tedford Lane, as the alley is the only access for most of the units. We have also requested that they install 2 additional streetlights in the alley, for safety purposes. City staff is also requesting the City Council authorize me, City Engineer, to record the Merger and Re-subdivision Tract Map upon satisfactory completion of the above-mentioned conditions. At this time of recording, the Merger and Re-subdivision will be complete. There are two owner/representatives here, Dave Snelgrove with CFA with Ed Lord his real estate representative. They are available for any questions. Sean Rowe and I are available if there are any questions on mergers or re-subdivisions.

Mayor Tedford stated that he has questions for Derek regarding some of the discussions he has had with them. I understand the driveway on Center Street because I see the condition it is in. There are about 3 or 4 spots of that sideway on Center Street.

Most of that sidewalk is good, between Whitaker and Tedford but there are 3 or 4 spots of the sidewalk that is like the driveway. Are they going to fix those spots too?

Engineer Derek Zimney stated that we can put those conditions of replacing the panels on the sidewalk.

Mayor Tedford stated that the rest of the panels are mostly good. There is, I think, 3 of them that are 3-4 feet that I have seen. I have real interest in the dirt plot of land, in the center of it, that really just can't stay just a dirt plot of land anymore. I was here in 1970 when that supposed to be a swimming pool. It has never been completed by Mr. Childers. I am not asking for a pool, but I am saying that it can't just be left a dirt plot of land for the children there. They will all end up in the street. Right now, they play in Center Street. The children on the west end side play on Whitaker. We need something with that Derek. You have had some discussion on that dirt plot of land, haven't you?

Engineer Derek Zimney stated that he spoke to the owner's rep this morning. They are going to provide me with a drawing, a sample, of what it will look like for review. We will make that as a conditional approval. That we accept their landscaping plan and that it gets completed before the map does. I will also go down and identify the sidewalk panels with pictures and maybe paint, and request those be replaced.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any further comments from Council.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she wants to get an idea of the amenity area. Is there going to be a playground area, or just a grass area that would have to be maintained by a Homeowner's Association. What is the concept there?

Engineer Zimney stated that he will let the owner's representation answer the question because he has not yet heard of a playground area, or if that was the intentions. I know that it is open space but let them discuss that. Yes, all the common area is going to be maintained by an HOA. They have prepared CC&Rs and that will be submitted the same time the map is recorded.

Mayor Tedford stated that it is a nice idea. Bob was here as well. I think this was the idea going way back. Wasn't it Bob? At least a portion of these were supposed to be sold into condos, at one time, weren't they?

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson stated that he believes Mr. Childer's concept of this project was to have condominium units. They were built along those lines structurally. They are oversized units when compared to an apartment complex. The market just wouldn't support it and turned it into an apartment complex.

Mayor Tedford stated that he likes the idea.

Councilwoman Frost asked if the current units are occupied, and will the current tenants be evicted?

Engineer Derek Zimney stated that his understanding is that the majority of them are occupied but they have offered some sort of first right or refusal for the current tenants, to give them an opportunity to get into them, if they are interested. That was what was conveyed to City staff. At this point, the actual statistics of how many people, I would let the owner's rep handle.

Dave Snelgrove, the Planning and Right of Way Manager with CFA at 1150 Corporate Blvd Reno, Nevada, greeted the Council. Appreciate the questions, appreciate being brought up. Ed and I are nodding and shaking our heads. I will try and cover each of the questions. The comments from Mayor Tedford relative to damage areas, sidewalks. This is the time that you can request those. We are asking something from the City, I lean back to Ed, and said, yeah, that will be fine. I think that there is going to be some places

that are little rougher than you would want. So, this is the opportunity to get those repaired. There has been work done on the side. All the driveways that are interior to the site got repaved, and part of the alley got repaved. The western half of the alley is still pretty darn rough, but the eastern half is much better, they had some fresh pavement put on it. Also, the walkway that is going into each unit, the stairways have been upgraded and improved. I think there was some damage there, much like what happens to sidewalks. With me, in the audience, is Ed Lord. He is a realtor working with the owner and he can speak to some of these questions. So, I gave you and handed out a packet of information. There is some 11x17 maps that are a little easier to read than an 8 ½ x 11, if you actually want to read some words. If you go down on the bottom, and they are very faint, but the 4th page of the colored sheets, down on the bottom right-hand corner, page 4, it's property access and parking. This one doesn't really talk much about the parking, but it shows where the access comes from. Mr. Zimney's comment on the alleyway providing primary access to most of the units, that is exactly correct, except for the far eastern side, there is a driveway that connects out to West Center. So, that is how you get into the property, and the next page goes through the parking and the amenity areas. That was an interesting bit of history on the intention of what that area was supposed to be at one point, that the Childers Estate was anticipating it to be a pool at one point. We would have a landscape area in there. Obviously, we are trying to work with drought tolerant landscape, and keep water usages as minimal as possible, while still providing an inviting and positive environment for the people that live within the Sierra Manor Towne Homes. On that 5th page it blocks that amenity area, which is roughly 9,700 square feet. We will provide a landscape plan and a plan on how that part of land would be developed out to Mr. Zimney and his team, as part of this. We have the conditions that we have to meet. I would anticipate that this would be one of the other things that we have to meet, and construction of that would have to be occurring or if there is bonding or anything that we can do to make sure that gets done. It had been mentioned that there were CC&Rs. We turned these in a while ago. We have been working through this, with your staff, for quite a while because initially the Assessor's map shows 1 parcel but when you dig down deep, you end up finding out that there were 11 single-family lots that were going to be there at one point. Those lot lands were never gotten rid of, which is why it is not just a final map but a Merger and Re-subdivision. So, we are going to merge those 11 parcels and then resubdivide them into the 30-units. Plus, the 51,000 square feet so there is over an acre of common area which is inclusive of the driveway areas, the to-be landscaped amenity area, the 8 spaces of common area, parking, that are on the site. Each unit will have its own carport and those will be in the area that they own, along with their unit. I was told by Mr. Lord that all but 3 of the units are occupied right now. What they have been doing is people have moved out, they have gone in and did remodeling. Mr. Lord could speak more on what they have been doing with the interiors of the units, as they are trying to bring them up. Since Mr. Yazdi bought the property in 2016, he has done quite a bit of improvements. Most of the units have been remodeled. I think there is 27 out of the 30. Is that correct Ed? 27 out of the 30 have had remodeling done within them. I am available for any other questions. I hope I answered all your questions adequately, but if I haven't, I am happy to answer more.

Councilman Richardson asked how many square feet an individual unit is.

Mr. Snelgrove stated that they range typically to just a little over 1,000 to about 1,150 square feet. There are different sizes that are in there.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any more questions.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she thinks it is good that we are requiring them to upgrade the alley. The last time I drove through it, it was very bumpy. Especially adding additional lighting, I think that will really improve the safety of the area.

Mr. Snelgrove stated that when he drove down it this morning, I was impressed that the eastern side of the alley was pretty smooth, but that western side is pretty bad.

Mayor Tedford stated that is the access for most of the units, other than that east side where people can get in on that east side, but not all of them do. You probably wouldn't get that access from NDOT, like you get off Tedford Lane in there, or Center Street. It certainly is the access for every other place on that map.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she would like to clarify her comments on the amenities. I don't know if you are targeting families or older couples, or what your target market is. If you aren't targeting families, you probably wouldn't need a playground. I didn't want to insist on that.

Mr. Snelgrove stated that unless you go age-restrictive on a project you probably are going to get whatever your demographic is, of the area. So, we will anticipate that there will be kids in there of all different age ranges. With only 30 units there won't be that many but there will be some children there that do need to play. There are a couple other courtyard areas, a couple of the units on the east and west side. They aren't as big as the dirt lot areas, and that presents a good opportunity for creating an amenity and play area that is essentially located at the center of the units.

Mayor Tedford stated that he believes we now need some discussion with Mr. Lords.

Ed Lords a real estate broker/salesman with Kirch Realty greeted the Council. I have been in the businesses for 27 years, here locally and Reno. This is a project we purchased approximately 6 years ago, and we have done extensive remodeling and improvements to the property since then, and we continue to do so.

Mayor Tedford stated that as he has heard, this is a great project. Mr. Childers wanted to do this earlier and then turned into an apartment complex back in the 70's. I think that Councilwoman Frost started to ask a question. Of the 30 that you have, are they occupied now, do you have vacancies in there:

Mr. Lords stated that all but three units are occupied. In the three that are not occupied, we are in the process of doing the same interior remodeling that we have been doing by attrition, as people would move out. The remodeling is quite extensive. We go to hardwood floors, we have the bathrooms, to make sure all the bathrooms are in. We got the kitchen and put all new cabinets and paint in there. They are thoroughly gone through.

Mayor Tedford stated that he knows what they looked like originally. My sister lived in a brand new one, on Tedford Lane, when she first got here, 30-40 years ago. How is this transformation going to occur? Are these people going to have an opportunity to purchase, are they going to get evicted? How is this all going to work? We are building houses and our occupancy rate in apartments are full. Perhaps those people in those apartments are going to have the opportunity to buy that house because rent is about what a house payment is. How is this all going to lay out?

Mr. Lords stated that was a fair question. The answer to that question is that we are going to be as flexible as we need to be. Number 1, to offer first right of refusal to the existing tenants, should they decide to purchase one of the units that they are living. In my mind, that is the path of least resistance, as far as that is concerned. I think that is only fair, if someone is currently living there and established residency here in Fallon. There is an established demand for affordable housing for ownership. I think that this project

clearly represents a viable alternative offering affordable housing for people that work within the Fallon Naval Air Station, or local here in the City. We are also very responsive in doing whatever you recommend with regards to the common area with regards to landscaping or maybe do a combination of landscaping and we can throw in some playground as well. I know there are some children that do live there. We have already repaved all the parking lots, that was done just recently. We were waiting on input from the City Council with how to treat the alleyway. The western part of the alleyway is probably the most worn. A lot of tractor/trailer traffic goes in and out of that roadway. When we were driving to the property this morning there was a big tractor/trailer pulling out, and that is probably why that area is a little more worn than the remainder because tractor/trailers use that entrance as their primary access. So, that first 100-150 feet will have to be completely R&R – remove and replace. To an engineer respect, we have already gone through some pricing from the people that did the parking lot repaving. So, we are pretty much open to comply with any recommendations that you would make.

Mayor Tedford commented regarding his original comment. The law provides that you have an eviction process when you are going through this. If you have 27 occupied, you only have 3 here you can sell when you have completed this process with us. There is, literally, right now, other than buying a new house or buying from you, there are no places that they can go rent an apartment in our community. That is probably going to be lessened if others, who rent apartments that buy houses that are being built right now, but they aren't done being built. Are you working with a bank, to help these people get financing? There are some people that are in there that are first time homeowners that can get help with their down payment. Elsie's office has a brochure with information that will help with first time homebuyers. That is certainly not going to be for any retired people that are looking to buy a condominium, which is attractive to some because they have already bought a home, so they aren't a first-time homebuyer. The young people that are in there, that would be of help to them. It is difficult for us, in a community, if you are going to put 27 people out on the street, with nowhere to go.

Mr. Lords stated that is a concern of theirs as well. I am working with Kelli Rogne, with Rogne Realty, who is the current property manager. She manages hundreds of apartments, condominiums, etc. We would be working closely with her to assist any existing tenant who would choose not to buy and need to relocate. We would certainly give them more than ample time than the legal minimum. We wouldn't have any problem giving anyone 60-90 days to relocate. I think that should be a reasonable timeframe but if you think it should be longer just let us know.

Mayor Tedford stated that information would go through Bob's office. The Council would share with me regarding my real concerns about people not having housing here. Not that we are opposed to your project because I think it is a good project. I am concerned about those people without a home either in the heat of the summer or when it gets cold in the winter, whenever that time would come. Does Council have any further questions? The only thing I think the Council needs to address is to make a motion to approve this and subject to the conditions that Derek has laid out, plus the additional conditions of fixing the sidewalks that are around there that may need some work. Also, that they come up with a plan for the dirt plot of land that is satisfactory to Derek's office. I think those are the only 2 conditions that aren't on Derek's list.

Councilman Richardson asked if the Council could get a follow up with what conditions were identified and what was completed. I would be interested what the final design would be for the dirt area and any other improvements that are agreed upon.

Mayor Tedford confirmed. I think that could be in the motion too. This is a lengthy motion because it is going to agree to these conditions, plus the additional 2 conditions of the dirt area, plus the sidewalks, plus a follow up, plus a follow up with Bob regarding the relocation of the tenants who are not able to purchase. Kelli Rogne is great and that comforts me.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments.

Mr. Geoff Knell of 261 Serpa Place stated that he lives in the City limits. In the Bible it says, the love of money is the root of all evil. I went to the County Commissioner's meetings and they uh, they approved a multi-family complex on the County property. Kay, taking away the food supply for the animals, for the love of money. Uh, Susan Sevon was there, and she testified that multi-family complex was being funded by the communist party corporations, amazing. I am kind of curious, where are they getting the funding from? Where are they getting the funding from? See, communists are buying our land to dominate. No, this is not conspiracy theory. Yeah, it's not. Yeah, but you know...ya' it's...I, I like to know where there funding is coming from. 'Cause ya' in the short term is, take everybody out of the small cities into the big cities. When I was in Reno on Sunday with my dog I had to kill time, and they are building like crazy. Apartments, movie theaters, casinos are being converted into condos...condos. More taxes, more money into the government by the poor and the less fortunate get the boot. Now, I get phone calls from Reno and say, the rents gone up, is there a place where I live where the rent is less, like \$800? But now they are up to over \$1,110. And the...the banking system, or the credit unions uh, were designed like Wells Fargo Bank, Bank of America, or these independent ones where they sell it to the banks, and they just... where they are going to design it where they are gonna' take away the property. 'Cause when you have a mortgage, who controls it? The bank, and they are gonna' foreclose. So, the people buying into this socalled redefined apartment complex or condo complex, I hope it has an elevator too. This is uh, two stories, ya' know? But...but what I'm tryin' to say is, there is a plan to destroy this nation and to take away our property rights. Like the preamp of the Declaration of Independence, it's property. Freedom, life, and property. Ownership. Ya, you don't see that, do ya? Communism, fascism, Nazis, they control every aspect of our lives and you...you're going with the flow, you're going with the flow. Just make a wise decision. Okay, I can...I can tell you know; I tell my Councilman Richardson to vote no on it. Yes, yes, yes. Just incredible. Just think...just think about it, okay? In the long-term it is by design. You diversified the population and do things...and, and it's...it's really sad. Alright, I've said enough.

Right now, they don't own anything, and they have the ability to own something for about what they are paying now in rent. I think many of them will stay where they are now, and it will be their home. For some, it will be their starter home so they will be available to move into another larger home in the community. That is what we are hearing, people want these starter homes that are not as big, and there are several of them being built in subdivisions, and these are about the same size of those homes that are being built. So, I think it is real opportunity for them to own something. I look forward to hearing that those numbers are successful.

## Consideration and possible approval of a Tentative Subdivision Map for Saddlehorn Subdivision.

Mayor Tedford stated that Derek was called out on an emergency. Chief of Staff Bob Erickson will be presenting this agenda item.

Chief of Staff thanked the Mayor. The City Council first approved a tentative map for this area in 2005 (Saddlebrook Subdivision), and then a second tentative map was approved in 2008 (Big Horn Subdivision) that was a combination of this parcel and the 25 Acres adjacent to the East. Those maps were approved with an in lieu of park fee of \$1,000 per lot. City Staff recommends accepting the same fee for this subdivision. This map has been reviewed by City Engineer Derek Zimney, Public Works Director Brian Byrd, and me Chief of Staff Bob Erickson. Letters of intent and copies of the proposed tentative map have been submitted to the Nevada Department of Environmental Protection, Nevada Division of Water Resources, Truckee-Carson Irrigation District, Churchill County, and the Churchill County School District. Those letters and responses from each agency are attached. The developer will cap all TCID structure within the subdivision area and that the sewer connection will be made, and the final one is that they will construct a retention pond on lot 15. Representatives from Lumos & Associates, Randy Heinz and property owner representative, Gary Hutchings are here and available with any questions.

Councilwoman Frost wanted the record to reflect the size of the lots for this project. Chief of Staff Bob Erickson stated that most of these lots they range in size, but the majority of the lots are 6,000 square feet.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any more questions or comments from the Council.

No further comments were noted.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments.

Whitney Brown at 485 Wood Drive stated that she is located on parcel 007-752-25 on the west side. My major question and concern are with the TCID ditch that runs through. That ditch has backed up, since I've lived there, twice. Once it flooded my home, and once it flooded my yard. My questions are on how that is going to continue to be maintained so that my home is not flooded.

Randy Heinz of Lumos & Associates stated that this would have to be something to follow up with TCID. That is a TCID easement, so that is theirs to maintain. Also, what we are doing is essentially piping it. We will be putting a trap on the inlet so it will be good to clean out debris getting in the pipe. This will be a little easier for them to maintain because it is a closed system at that point. So, it will be easier to maintain with that trap unit. We can coordinate that with Cody over there.

Brian Gardner at 755 Wood Drive addressed the Council with questions regarding the retention pond. I have a ditch that borders the new subdivision, on the south side of the canal that Whitney is talking about. It feeds all my irrigation, 3 acres. I am asking how far away a house will be from that ditch and there is a pond on the corner, I don't know the parcel behind my house, next to the TCID ditch, not the first pond. I am asking where it is at on the parcel, I can't read the print on the map. Mr. Gardner showed Randy Heinz which parcel his one on the map he was provided in the agenda. I am curious what is going on and I don't know what is on this side of the ditch if I come out here, and through here, with my yard.

Randy Heinz stated that this road (showing Mr. Gardner on the map in hand), is actually going to have another subdivision on this side and will not access on this side because we aren't doing a subdivision on that side. When we do process this one being piped, under the road you will still be able to access water here.

Mr. Gardner asked what is being done with "all of this" (pointing on map), is this bending wall. So, the existing ground that washed out this lot. (Inaudible)

Randy Heinz stated that they will have to look into the ditch area. We will have to make some accommodations as well.

Mr. Gardner stated that TCID doesn't maintain the ditch. There are weeds growing and I had to cut down trees that are in your property, or whoever's property it is, I don't know. I built a pile in the back of my yard, but there are trees growing all back there. Is this going to be maintained too? It was my understanding that it was TCID's.

Conversation between Mr. Heinz and Mr. Gardner were happening but could not be heard on the recording.

Mr. Heinz showed Mr. Gardner where the property line was that TCID owned. We are probably going to be building up a little bit. We will look into this to be sure that it isn't flowing along that road. So, there are some things here that we will need to take care of. We have staff that will be available to answer these questions.

Mr. Gardner stated to just swing by his house.

Mr. Heinz stated that they will come by to see him. We will talk about the details. Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any further comments.

Debt Management Policy and Indebtedness Report provided by the JNA Consulting Group and reviewed by City Staff. The Debt Management Policy was created to fulfill the requirements of NRS 350.013. The Policy discusses that the outstanding debt of the City, its ability to afford such debt and other items relating to the issuance of bonds by the City. As of June 30, 2022, the City has \$1,783,000.00 of medium-term general obligation debt outstanding, which consists of a medium-term bond issue, fiscal year 2021 for various purposes across several funds. The City also has \$6,526,108.00 in general obligation revenue supported bonds, which includes \$5,570,000.00 outstanding from our sewer bonds and \$956,108.00 outstanding from two Water Refunding Bonds. All together we have \$8,309,108.00 of general obligation debt as of June 30, 2022. We also have other debt which includes \$5,129,000.00 outstanding Electric System Refunding revenue bonds. Lastly, we have \$120,355.00 of Lease Purchase Obligations related to Lease Purchases in the Sanitation Fund. Included with the Debt Management Policy is a 5-year Capital Improvement Plan for the first fiscal year of 2022-2023 matches that Capital outlets submitted in the current year's final budget back in May of 2022. According to our Debt Management Policy, which includes the Capital Improvement Plan and Indebtedness Report to the Department of Taxation as required annually per statute. I will be presenting our Debt Management Policy on August 18th at the next Churchill Debt Management meeting.

Mayor Tedford asked if there were any questions or comments from the Council or public.

Diane Arviso the Director of homeownership programs with Nevada Rural Housing Authority ("NRHA") greeted the Council. It is always my extreme pleasure to come here every year to meet with you to give you an update on what our home-at-last homeownership programs are doing, answer any questions that you may have, and of course continue to ask for your support in transferring any unused private activity bond cap to Nevada Rural Housing Authority in support of our homeownership programs that serve rural Nevada exclusively. As a background for anyone that isn't familiar or loves to get a refresher, we all love refreshers, right? In 2006, NRHA launched the home-at-last homeownership program to allow affordable housing. What is affordable? Affordable means basically what is affordable to the family or the homebuyer that is purchasing the home, right? Everyone needs a home within their budget. We serve low- and moderateincome homebuyers with the program and we do that by providing down payment assistance towards the purchase of a mortgage, or a home. We provide that first mortgage, along with the down payment assistance at an affordable interest rate. We also provide mortgage tax credits, which always kind of makes people's heads spin because there is a lot of mystery of what that actually looks like. I can share with you today the impact of the mortgage tax credit program, it is profound. Especially, when we are facing inflation at skyrocketing, record levels, and how that also opens the door to homeownership for renters who pay their bills, are responsible, have stable income, and deserve an opportunity to buy a home, but down payment is their barrier, and long-term affordability is a factor. So, I will share with you since 2006 the NRHA homeownership program has received transfers from the City of Fallon totaling about 4.9 million, that's not dollars but that's bond cap authority, and that's been since 2006. First I have to thank you for your years of support there. Since that time, we've helped 177 homebuyers within the City limits of Fallon. There is an additional number I can share with you in the unincorporated area, but that is specific to the City limits. That's providing 31.3 million in affordable mortgages to these homebuyers, over 1 million dollars in down payment assistance has been provided to these families, and approximately \$320,000 in estimated federal tax savings through the mortgage credit certificate program which of course is money that they reinvest when they shop locally. 16 years after launching the home-at-last program, in rural Nevada alone, we've provided 2.2 billion in affordable mortgages, about 63 million in down payment assistance, and helped over 10,000 families achieve affordable home ownership under the program. The estimated federal tax savings generated through the mortgage credit certificate is about 37 million dollars. Nevada Rural Housing Authority is asking for your continued support this year. We would continue to use that for home ownership programs. Specifically, the mortgage tax credit program. To give you an idea of the impact that the mortgage certificate program provides, I would like to help you visualize a \$345,000 mortgage at a 5.5% interest, which is typical for right now, that would generate in just the first year, almost \$3,800 in tax savings to that family. That is a dollar-for-dollar federal tax credit that is returned to that borrower. It is specific to first time homebuyers and qualified veterans are exempt from the first-time homebuyer rule, which is very important here in Fallon. That savings equates to \$314.00 a month. That \$314.00 a month is considered additional qualifying income to help buyers qualify, to help a family afford the right home for their family, and they get that tax credit for the life of the loan. So, it helps them qualify, lowers debt to income ratios, if they are carrying student loan debt, that's especially helpful, and it helps them for every year for the life of the loan. NRHA's jurisdiction is to serve areas with populations under 150,000. So, of course, that is Fallon. Your transfer of private activity bond cap that is not being used for

another project would stay in rural Nevada, and that is very important to us, since that is the area that we serve. I am happy to answer any questions that you might have. I know that you all have been very familiar and supportive of the homeownership programs. They are promoted locally on your local radio stations, and I want to thank you for all the support you've thrown behind the programs and the organization over these years.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any questions from Council.

Diane Arviso asked if she could add something for the benefit of the public. The private activity bond cap is not a dollar item on your budget. The transfer of this is not a financial impact directly to the City of Fallon. In the unused cap, that is not used for another project and would revert to the State of Nevada on September 1<sup>st</sup>, in which case it would be used in probably an urban area like Las Vegas and Reno, which is where the demand is for the use of private activity bonds. If you had a competing project like a multi-family housing project, for example. I wouldn't be here today other than to give you an update on the program report. I would never want to come in and ask for a transfer if you had another project. So, it is specific to any unused cap, that we want to transfer because we can pool that cap with other city and counties that aren't using it and that is what makes a very robust program. I just wanted to provide a little insight on that.

Mayor Tedford thanked Diane and asked if there were any questions and public comment.

No comments were noted.

Councilman Richardson motioned to approve and adopt Resolution 22-08: A resolution of the City Council of Fallon, Nevada providing for the transfer of the City's 2022 Private Activity Bond Volume Cap to the Nevada Rural Housing authority; and other matters related thereto, seconded by Councilwoman Kent, and approved with a 2-0 vote by the Council.

Public hearing for Bill No 788: An Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulations," to add Chapter 5.56 entitled "Shopping Carts" which provides for the regulation of shopping carts within the City of Fallon; declares the presence of shopping carts public nuisances in certain situations; requires businesses that provide shopping carts to create a shopping cart retrieval procedure; provides for the retrieval and impounding by the City or its agents of shopping carts in certain situations.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that Bill No 788 was introduced to the City Council's properly noticed special meeting on June 29, 2022. Notice of the Deposit of copies of the proposed Ordinance and the public meeting hearing date was duly published in the Lahontan Valley News on July 21, 2022. The proposed Ordinance, as introduced, and proof of the statement of publication of the notice and deposit copies and public hearing to adopt Bill No 788 have been included in the agenda packet. This agenda item represents the public's opportunity to comment on the proposed Ordinance, and to present relevant information and materials to the Council.

Mayor Tedford asked if Deputy City Attorney could go over the Ordinance.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe confirmed. The Ordinance, as proposed, provides, and addresses the issues the City has been facing with shopping carts accumulating in public and private property throughout the City. It does this through a number of mechanisms. The first would be to create clear definitions for the regulation of these items in the community. Section .020 declares the presence of shopping carts on

public and private property a nuisance, which means that they cause certain life, health, and safety issues for the population of the City. Section .030 requires shopping cart owners to implement a management plan and a retrieval plan, that they would also present to the City. Section B of that, defines the measures to retrieve shopping carts from public and private property, that are going to be required of shopping cart owners. Section .040 provides for the retrieval and impoundment of shopping carts found off premises by the City. Section .050 deals with the disposal of abandoned shopping carts, permitting the City to dispose of shopping carts that have been abandoned and collected by the City, and not retrieved by their owners.

Mayor Tedford asked Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe if he could inform, for the record, that the City looked at several cities' shopping cart policies. Some were more stringent, some were less stringent; we used Clark County, Las Vegas, N Las Vegas, City of Reno, Sparks, and Watsonville, California.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe also stated that the City reviewed Texas municipalities as well. We were just looking for the variety of different ways that municipalities have attempted to regulate and deal with the problem of shopping carts being taken off premises and accumulating in these public places and becoming nuisances by being left in streets and causing cars to be damaged as a result. We went through a very lengthy review process of other nearby municipalities as well as farther a field to see what type of regulatory actions have been taken. This is an attempt to balance the burden that the City has mostly exclusively born, for the last number of years, and try to balance that burden with the owners of the shopping carts as well. I will note, this action was brought, after numerous attempts by City staff, to try and rectify this issue without creating an ordinance. When I suggested an ordinance 6 months ago, I was told that this is not the route that we want to take. I know this was not the route that we want to take because we want to be seen as a business-friendly community. However, it is also imperative that we address the issue for the citizens, and the fact that these carts have been taken off premises does create burdens on those businesses as well. This is an attempt to address in a multi-faceted way, the problem of these shopping carts being take off premises and create something that is fair and clear so the businesses know what to expect so we can assist them in maintaining their property.

Mayor Tedford thanked Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe. I think that sums it up in a nutshell. We have been going through this for quite a while and trying to get cooperation from some individual businesses to police themselves. Not every business that has a shopping cart doesn't oblige and get their shopping carts on their own. It is just a few, but the few are creating quite a problem for us with their shopping carts leaving their premises. We haven't been able to get them to work with us. This has been a process for several months, trying to go through other cities' ordinances to see what a fair and workable solution would be. We don't usually bring many ordinances to the table because we are friendly to the public and businesses. This is one that I think is necessary. It does allow for the businesses to have a plan for their carts to present to City staff, that will prevent from leaving their premises, so we don't have to have them picked up and have them pay a fee to have them retrieved or for us to dispose of them. There are five plans that are permitted by this Ordinance that are numerated in the ordinance. Are there any questions from the Council?

Councilwoman Kent stated that it is amazing how many carts that leave the premises of businesses. I do believe that the City has done all that they can to cooperate and be business-friendly. I see there is no other way than this Ordinance.

Councilman Richardson asked if we have received any plans from any businesses. Mayor Tedford stated we have not.

Councilman Richardson asked if they are aware of the Ordinance, or was it just published for them to find out on their own?

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe said that the Ordinance was published but also wanted to point out that he and Chief of Staff Bob Erickson had a meeting with, at least one manager of a local store and informed them of our intention to pass this if we didn't see an increase of cooperation of some kind. That store manager was appreciative, in some ways, of this. They felt this would give them some leverage with their corporate offices to address the issue.

Mayor Tedford stated that the other business we have a particular problem with, Bob could probably answer this. I think he and Kris met with them and their response was even with the picking up of the carts, was that they would get back to us, but never really got back to us. Would that be a fair statement?

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson confirmed. The volume of the carts basically, come from two places: Walmart and Safeway. Kris and I met with the local management on numerous occasions. They basically both said that they don't have any authority, locally, to address this issue and would communicate the situation with their regional management. Eventually, Safeway's regional management authorized them to come and retrieve the carts. They sent a contractor out of San Francisco to retrieve approximately 68 carts we had in storage. That occurred about 1 month ago. Walmart still hasn't responded on a corporate level to their local management, but we did receive a call from their assistant manager there about a week ago and he wanted to know how many Walmart customers carts we had in the yard. We conveyed that information to him, and he indicated that they would be probably retrieving them, but they haven't yet. Both stores have said that they have a program in place at the corporate level to retrieve carts. Both of those programs the contractor comes out of California. According to the Walmart management, they require a large volume of carts before they will make the expenditure to travel from San Francisco, to Fallon, Nevada to search out carts and try and retrieve and return to them to the corporation. Safeway has contractors, one from Reno and another one from California that are supposed to come out and look for carts and retrieve them. In either case that doesn't happen. The local management makes the calls and asks them to come and there is just no response. That was one of the things that forced us to look for another solution to this decades old problem. Right now, as of a couple of days ago, we had 252 Walmart carts in storage, since Safeway retrieved their carts, we have two different Safeway carts since they have updated their carts. What we call the newer black carts, they retrieved 68 of those, and we've accumulated 34 more since that retrieval. In addition, we have what we call the old brown carts, and we have 22 in stock now. That has been in the course of about 1 month. The other carts we have are Walgreens-3, Louies-3, The Dollar Tree-15, Harbor Freight-2, and CVS-1. So, the bulk of the issue is with major retailers in the community.

Mayor Tedford stated that we don't have the space to keep all of these carts.

Councilwoman Kent asked if the Safeway older carts were left because they don't want them back, leaving for us to dispose?

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson stated that when they came to retrieve them, they opted to just retrieve the black ones. They said they weren't picking up the other carts.

Councilman Richardson asked if this was a decision made at a local manager level, verses on a corporate or regional level.

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson stated that all of the decisions are made on a corporate level according to the local management. They will tell you; they don't have the authority to authorize the \$10 retrieval fee, or authorize that expenditure, that has to come from corporate. We get referred to different department. Safeway has a department in Reno that is primarily in charge of refurbishing carts. They also addressed the issue of these carts. That is where the decision was delegated to. They basically, have a fair amount of authority in that department. I guess you would have to call it a bureaucracy, and you have to mull your way through it.

Councilman Richardson stated that he is surprised that they don't have a representative here today to give us feedback or make comments of how this may impact them. Or, if they have any ideas for a solution because we obviously want to work together with businesses. This has almost been a one-way street, that we are going to come up with this Ordinance and we are only going to hold the carts for 30-days. It is going to have an impact on them, and I hope they have a plan.

Chief of Staff Bob Erickson stated that has been conveyed to them for the last 10 months, that I know about, directly and quite regularly. The road of communication throughout the organization gets lost somewhere.

Mayor Tedford stated that we were told Walmart just orders new carts, that is why their number gets so high.

Councilman Richardson stated that it doesn't make business sense, but that we will see.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments.

Geoff Knell of 261 Serpa Place stated that he is one of the constituents that went to the Police and talked about the shopping carts. When I walk my dog and they are everywhere. Basically, at the low-income housing, multi-family complexes. Now I see mainly Safeway and Walmart, but then there is CVS, The Dollar Store, and so forth. What I am reflecting is Exodus 20 where it says, thou shall not steal. The morality of this City allowing and not bringing any justice to... to get people to encourage them to stop taking the shopping carts off of the premises because it is being an inconvenience. I..I want to make a suggestion and get to the low-income rural housing and development. Make a rule to the uh, low-income people, ya' know, they make decisions on their property, is to put in there, it's...do not take things that are not yours. Ya' know they want to protect their property and all their different circumstances, but this tell ya', this uh...this was getting outta' hand. Ridiculous. Thou shall not steal. Now, how is the City going to develop a morality to be honest and truthful? Would you rather buy cigarettes and liquor, instead of buying, what... a \$49.00, well, it is probably a lot more now, wagon you can fold up, if you live upstairs, then you carry it up stairs. Instead of taking something that causes corporation budgets to go up and they have to spread it out somewhere. Now, getting into corporations, Mr. Mayor, and recently there in Sparks, I can't remember the street name, but it is off of 395 heading North. Ya' know hit the spaghetti bowl and make a right, they have a system there, now, at least when I was there, you could bring it...don't cross this line. The wheels lock up. There is, there is things that can happen. Things to prevent the stealing. And in closing, helping to stop the thievery, helping them to stop it. So, it's just...it's just some suggestions there and so...thou shall not steal. Thank you.

Mayor Tedford stated that one of the methods in the Ordinance is that lock up system. 5.56.030 subsection A, wheel locking mechanism installed on all shopping carts used in conjunction with an electronic barrier along the perimeter of the premises, which

is activated when a shopping cart crosses an electronic barrier. That is one of their options, out of the 5 options to stop them leaving the property. James said it right, if they don't implement one of these 5 options to keep these shopping carts on their property in 30-days, we are taking them to the landfill. These are expensive carts. The reason why we have struggled with this for a few months now, putting this in place, is I own a business, Karla owns a business, and James is the one that made the comment it doesn't make business sense. I wouldn't lose a cart at any time, we would go find them at the end of the day if the cart didn't go back. These are expensive. We own little businesses, compared to these organizations. To hear the comment that the reason why we have 268 of Walmart's carts is because they just go buy more carts, and to hear the story that Safeway was out of carts on a weekend because we had them all, it is unbelievable that you would put your customers through that. We can't answer some of these questions for these companies, but we do know that, besides them being aesthetically unpleasing to many of our citizens, our street sweeper can't sweep, people with wheelchairs and on walkers can't walk through the sidewalks, and people like yourself can't walk their dog on a leash because they are getting caught up on shopping carts on the sidewalks. We just have to figure out how to stop this. We first started with our crews picking them up, and that wasn't working. Now, we have a service we are paying for to pick them up and charging them when they are retrieved. We tried many things. We had the Boy Scouts delivering to them at one time. This is where we are headed and I think this is the thing we see many cities doing, so it isn't just happening in Fallon, Nevada. The businesses themselves don't want to seem to press charges on the people that are taking them. It is a frustrating process. Although, they certainly want us to press charges on shoplifters on crimes that are a lot less in value, I think even those in the Municipal Court would testify, than the price of that. We are constantly in there for, what I call, very insignificant crimes for shoplifting, for crimes that are a lot less costly than a shopping cart, which we are never in there for. I think we will move on if there are no further comments.

No further comments were noted.

Consideration and possible adoption of Bill No 788: An Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulations," to add Chapter 5.56 entitled "Shopping Carts" which provides for the regulation of shopping carts within the City of Fallon; declares the presence of shopping carts public nuisances in certain situations; requires businesses that provide shopping carts to create a shopping cart retrieval procedure; provides for the retrieval and impounding by the City or its agents of shopping carts in certain situations.

Deputy City Attorney Sean Rowe stated that the Council can choose to adopt the bill as presented, amend it, or not adopt it. It is completely in the prerogative of this Council to determine how to proceed with this Ordinance as presented.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any comments or questions from the public or Council.

No comments were noted.

Councilman Richardson motioned to adopt of Bill No 788: An Ordinance amending the City of Fallon Municipal Code, Title Five "Business Licenses and Regulations," to add Chapter 5.56 entitled "Shopping Carts" which provides for the regulation of shopping carts within the City of Fallon; declares the presence of shopping carts public nuisances in certain situations; requires businesses that provide shopping carts to create a shopping cart

retrieval procedure; provides for the retrieval and impounding by the City or its agents of shopping carts in certain situations, seconded by Councilwoman Kent and approved with a 2-0 vote by the Council.

# Public meeting for discussion of possible state Community Development Block Grant Applications for fiscal year 2023-2024

City Engineer Derek Zimney stated that the purpose of this meeting is to provide information about the CDBG program, past projects that have been funded in the City of Fallon, how to apply, eligibility requirements, how and where funds can be used, and to give citizens an opportunity to make their comments known regarding what types of eligible activities the City of Fallon should apply for under the State CDBG program. A second public hearing will be held on September 6, 2022, in order to discuss proposed projects submitted to date. A final hearing will be held prior to February 18, 2023, to discuss, approve and rank applications prior to submittal to the State. We have been on a bit of a hot streak with CDBG, and we would love to keep that momentum. We haven't proposed any projects yet. The first one, just for discussion, we are required to have 3 postings and I am more than happy to answer any questions or get to the bottom of any eligible activities that anyone may want to propose.

Councilman Richardson asked if we received any other requests from CDBG grants from outside entities.

City Engineer Derek Zimney stated he has not received any outside requests.

Mayor Tedford stated that we have done pretty well with trying to find a street project that works. So, perhaps that is where we shall head. We did Front Street, then we did N Broadway and N Sherman, and now we are doing Court Street. We are in the design phase of finishing all of those. We need to get a shovel in the ground on all of those. Perhaps you could find one of those that will work Derek.

City Engineer Derek Zimney stated that he will make a list.

Mayor Tedford stated that he hopes he already has a list, we just need to prioritize it. I would like to find something that don't affect our citizens as closely as those do. Any public comments?

No further comments were noted.

#### **Public Comments**

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments. He noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. Ya' know you're going to go through a lot of paperwork and codes and stuff with restrictions. It's getting ridiculous. How...we...is the City gonna' survive if we keep cooperating with the state government that doesn't give a hoot about morality in this state, doesn't care. Ya' know I am going to encourage you that believing and trusting the Lord Jesus Christ bring you in a mindset of being fiscal responsible. Thank you.

The Honorable City Council met in a regular meeting on the above date in the Council Chambers, 55 West Williams Avenue, Fallon, Nevada.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Tedford at 9:00 a.m.

Mayor Tedford led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Tedford inquired if the agenda had been posted in compliance with NRS requirements.

#### **Public Comments**

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments. He noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. No action may be taken on a matter raised under this item until the matter has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action will be taken.

Abolghasse Abraham Sadegh a current resident at the Fallon Lodge greeted the Council. I have two items that I would like to talk about. The first one, I have been profiled and persecuted by our Police Department, and it has to do with my faith. After 12 years I returned to Iran in 1925, experienced the (inaudible) and the present one, and under the present one I

realized the religion to which I was born (inaudible) is a cult of personalities. My father in-law was uh, a Minister of Churchill (inaudible) and his daughter and I met at the University of Texas, and we got married. So, this one page is what represents my faith. Its book is called The Koran or Koran and in chapter 112, the name unity I have quoted here. In the name of God, the compassionate and merciful, it is saying and directing (inaudible) or anyone. Say, is God the one God, the Absolute, He gets not or was he begotten, and there is none comparable to him? In the face of current knowledge of the universe. For example, our galaxy, it takes 200-225 million years for the solar system to rotate around the center of the universe. There are billions of stars and ours is an average one. So, uh...uh considering the present knowledge with billions of (inaudible) galaxy continuing to believe that Jesus is God is idolatry. We should refer to God not as He but rather "it" nor is it either he or she. Believing in God is optional, believing in humanity is not. We are judged not by not how we perceive ourselves but what goes on in our hearts according to the human beings. (Inaudible) which is (inaudible) for my faith that I call the University of (inaudible). Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any further public comments. No further comments were noted.

#### **Approval of Warrants**

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve the accounts payable, payroll and customer deposit warrants; seconded by Councilwoman Frost and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible adoption of Resolution No 22-09, a Resolution authorizing the Red Mesa Tapaha Solar Project Amended and Restated Transaction Schedule under the Power Supply Agreement with Utah Associated Municipal Power Systems.

City Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson greeted the Council, For the last several years, UAMPS, on behalf of its members have been investigating and consulting for the Red Mesa Tapaha Solar Project Amended and Restated Transaction Schedule under the Power Supply Agreement with Utah Associated Municipal Power Systems. This is a 66megawatt solar generation facility located on the Navajo Nation Reservation in southeastern Utah. UAMPS is now prepared to enter into an amended 25-year Power Purchase Agreement "PPA" with the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority Generation - Utah, LLC on behalf of UAMPS members electing to participate in the project. The PPA has a price of \$37.00/MW with no price escalators. The City Council previously adopted resolution 19-21 on August 5, 2019, which was a PPA with a price of \$23.15/MW with an escalator of 2% each year. Then, due to COVID, supply chain issues, and increased costs, UAMPS renegotiated with the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority to the terms in the current PPA. City staff has met and discussed this project several times and recommends moving forward with this agreement. The facility is scheduled to become operational in March 2023. If approved, the attached Red Mesa Tapaha Solar Firm Power Supply Agreement Transaction Schedule would give the City of Fallon an entitlement of share of 1 MW. If there are any questions, I would be glad to answer them.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any questions from Council.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she has a couple of questions. If we were to go out and try to purchase this in the open market today, how much would it possibly cost us?

City Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that UAMPS did speak about that a little bit as they went back and renegotiated. UAMPS and members of UAMPS both said that \$37.00/MW, right now is pretty much what the market is currently. If we were to move forward with another project, very similar, it would most likely be more than that. So, this is market right now and the market is increasing daily.

Councilwoman Frost inquired if the \$37.00/MW would be good for the next 25years.

City Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson stated that is correct. That is a fixed cost for a firm project. And yes, it is for a 25-year term.

Councilwoman Frost stated that being a solar project, it would qualify for renewable credits.

City Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson confirmed that it would be eligible for August 16, 2022 Fallon City Council Meeting

renewable credits.

Councilwoman Frost thanked City Clerk-Treasurer Sean Richardson.

Mayor Tedford stated, for the record, we aren't sure that we need renewable credits. I am not sure if in the future if that might change. Which is a good reason why we should be in some of these projects. Right now, we don't think we need renewable credits. If Sean or Trent can come to the podium to confirm his statements.

Deputy City Attorney Trent deBraga confirmed Mayor Tedford's statement. So, I think back in 2019 when the Legislature passed Legislation, they created an exemption in the renewable energy portfolio standards. So, right now, the way it is worded, unless an energy provides over a million-megawatt hours in a calendar year, you are exempt from the renewal energy standard. I think in 2021, the City of Fallon provided approximately 92,100/MW, which is not even 10% of the standard. Of course, we are always at the mercy of the Legislature, and that could change, but as of now, we are exempt from having any renewable portfolio standards.

Mayor Tedford stated that it is the City's belief, that we should just push forward with these renewable energy units when we can get them in case that changes. Are there any public comments or questions?

No further comments were noted.

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve and adopt Resolution No 22-09, a Resolution authorizing the Red Mesa Tapaha Solar Project Amended and Restated Transaction Schedule under the Power Supply Agreement with Utah Associated Municipal Power Systems, seconded by Councilwoman Frost, and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible action to approve a construction contract with Sierra Nevada Construction of Sparks, Nevada, in order to complete the 2022 Preventative Maintenance project, PWP-CH-2022-405, in the total amount of Seven Hundred Seventy-Four Thousand and Seven Dollars (\$774,007).

Public Works Director Brian Byrd greeted the Council. This project is a continuation of a multi-phased approach to preventative street maintenance and rehabilitation throughout the City. Slated for the Fall of 2022, this phase of our preventative maintenance plan would allow for the application of 1,931,293 square feet of crack and slurry seal. The application of pavement crack seal and Type II rapid setting slurry to existing pavements will aid in filling cracks and voids, creating a weather-tight seal and providing color and texture to surfaces while prolonging life expectancy. Working with Lumos & Associates, the City of Fallon has performed a conditions assessment survey of existing City streets. The data complied from that survey was used to classify existing pavements into two categories based off the applicable pavement preservation techniques. The scope of this project includes portions of approximately 50 streets throughout the City that were deemed appropriate for a crack and slurry seal application. This project was released for public bid on July 14, 2022 and was advertised in the Lahontan Valley News in accordance with NRS 338.1385. 2 bids were received and opened on August 4, 2022, as further described in the attached documents. Again, this is just a continuation of our Preventative Maintenance Plan and working with Lumos & Associates, we identified these streets as the next applicable project from our priority list. We are excited and have doubled what we did in the Spring of this year. This will be one of the first years, with this approach, that we will be able to grab 2 projects and it is

exciting. By the end of the calendar year, we will have applied this technique to nearly 3 million square feet of City streets.

Mayor Tedford stated that this is a good project and really the most streets that we have ever done.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that he is excited about the unit cost pricing. It is pretty similar to what we received in the Spring. The 21-22 project and SNC does great work, they are familiar with our internal processes of public outreach and notification, and we are excited to be able to accomplish this.

Councilwoman Frost asked if we are hoping, in the future, to continue to carry on the Fall/Spring maintenance, if we can afford it.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that we would as resources allow and is probably the best approach. When we have time, and we can bid it early enough, we can have it crack sealed and slurry sealed all in one season. Previous years, we have cracked sealed, let that set over the Winter, then, come back in the Spring and slurry over the top of it. This is equally as effective.

Mayor Tedford stated that it should be noted, this is only for streets that have the ability to be crack sealed and slurred. You know, A Street, Broadway, and Sherman are all major rebuilds. As you know, N Front Street, that whole project, was a major rebuild. N Whitaker, Rancho, those are major rebuilds, and are all coming. So, this is really prolonged the life of some of our streets, that could have this done. Any more questions for Brian from the Council or public?

Councilwoman Kent stated that with all the rebuilds we have had slated and with all the street repairs, we are making a lot of progress, and I hear a lot less pothole issues.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any further comments from the public or Council.

No further comments were noted.

Councilwoman Frost motioned to approve a construction contract with Sierra Nevada Construction of Sparks, Nevada, in order to complete the 2022 Preventative Maintenance project, PWP-CH-2022-405, in the total amount of Seven Hundred Seventy-Four Thousand and Seven Dollars (\$774,007), seconded by Councilman Richardson, and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible approval of a professional services contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for engineering design services for the Reconstruct Taxi Lanes & Entrance Road, Relocate Taxiway G, Runway 3 Safety Area Erosion Control Improvement Project in an amount not-to-exceed One Hundred Eighty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$189,200), of which the FAA share would be 93.75% or One Hundred Seventy-Seven Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy-Five Dollars (\$177,375) and the City's share would be 6.25% or Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-Five (\$11,825).

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that consideration and possible approval of a professional services contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for engineering design services for the Reconstruct Taxi Lanes & Entrance Road, Relocate Taxiway G, Runway 3 Safety Area Erosion Control Improvement Project, as it's next Airport Capital Improvement Project. If approved, J-U-B would complete the engineering and design and bidding services for the project would then be submitted to the FAA for approval. If approved the FAA portion would be reimbursable when a grant is received for

construction costs in the Summer of 2023. This project was identified in our Capital Improvement Plan for 2022. Typically, the FAA will fund the design of the project in one fiscal year and once that design is approved, the City will apply for the actual construction phase of the project in the next cycle. This is typically how the FAA projects work. For 2 years in a row the FAA had funded projects at 100%. Unfortunately, they are back to the norm at the 93.75%. We also have in attendance today, David Myers and Mike Wilhelm with J-U-B, and they have both done an incredible job representing the City of Fallon and helping us program these projects.

Councilwoman Frost wanted to confirm that the FAA has already given approval of this grant and the City would be reimbursed once the engineering report has been completed.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that was correct.

Mayor Tedford stated that nothing is for sure until it is completed. I just don't count on anything until it is all complete.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that he has learned that lesson in his 5 years working here.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any comments or questions from the public or Council. We have been disappointed with the FAA lately with some of our projects we thought were completed. Somehow, the money evaporated. I am hoping that doesn't happen on this project. It is much like that advertisement, "This isn't your daddy's FAA."

Councilwoman Frost asked if we had anything in writing giving us approval.

Mayor Tedford stated that he thought we had writing on the prior projects as well. During a virtual meeting I noticed that the grants we thought we had, disappeared. I think it surprised J-U-B as well. We compete against Southern Nevada for grants, where before we didn't use to.

Councilwoman Frost stated that it is still a necessary project to move forward for the Airport.

Mayor Tedford agreed. We still have to pursue them like we have done before, and it is a good project. Are there any further comments or questions from the public or Council?

No further comments were noted.

Councilman Richardson motioned to approve a professional services contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc. for engineering design services for the Reconstruct Taxi Lanes & Entrance Road, Relocate Taxiway G, Runway 3 Safety Area Erosion Control Improvement Project in an amount not-to-exceed One Hundred Eighty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$189,200), of which the FAA share would be 93.75% or One Hundred Seventy-Seven Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy-Five Dollars (\$177,375) and the City's share would be 6.25% or Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-Five (\$11,825), seconded by Councilwoman Frost and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Consideration and possible action to approve a construction contract with Herback General Engineering of Minden, Nevada, in order to complete the Sherman Street & North Broadway Street Rehabilitation project, PWP-CH-2022-408, in the amount of Three Million Three Hundred Thousand One Hundred Eighty-Six Dollars and Twenty-Five Cents (\$3,300,186.25).

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that on April 5, 2021, the City of Fallon received communication from the Governor's Office of Economic Development

indicating an award of \$885,463 of Community Development Block Grant Funding for the 2021 grant cycle. Since the time of award, the City has worked diligently to complete the design, advertise, and bid the project in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes as well as the Code of Federal Regulations. As advertised, the project consists of a full reconstruction of Sherman Street from East Williams Avenue to Augusta Lane, as well as specified portions of North Broadway Street. The project generally includes demolition and removal of the existing roadway, landscaping, paving, sanitary sewer, storm drains, and waterlines. Construction elements of the project include: The installation of curb, gutter, sidewalk, paving sanitary sewer, street lighting, storm drain manholes, on street parking, and landscaping improvements. This project was released for public bid on July 14, 2022 and was advertised in the Lahontan Valley News in accordance with NRS 338.1385. A pre-bid meeting was held on July 22, 2022. I bid was received and opened on August 4, 2022, as further described in the attached documents. This is another project that we are really excited to accomplish. It is a big ask, but the impact that it will have in that area of the community, is huge. The County has indicated and evaluated how much they will be able to participate in helping fund the project because obviously, the County Road Department being on N Broadway, impacts that road in a negative way. So, they are willing to help fund a portion of it. So, we are working through that process right now.

Councilwoman Frost stated that this is a very necessary project. We haven't worked with Herback before but from my understanding they have a very good reputation, especially in Douglas County. Is that correct?

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that was correct. Herback targets public works projects quite a bit and they do a significant amount of federal work, which is important to us because with the CDBG being involved the Federal Grant process is relatively cumbersome. Having someone in their office that is familiar with payroll and public works is critical. Lumos & Associates also does a great job in helping us navigate through the process.

Councilwoman Frost stated that we always get a little nervous with only 1 bid. Is this well within the engineering estimate of the cost?

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that it is. When we came to the Council and asked to fund the design of this project, Lumos & Associates estimated that project to be approximately 2 and ½ million dollars, and that was 18 months ago. So, with the escalation that we have been witnessing is what got the price to 3.2 million, it is typical. It is a good bid for the market. If it wasn't, I would bring you a recommendation to reject the only bid. Lumos & Associates performs engineer's estimate with more real time data before the bid occurs and they had it at, I believe 3.2 million. So, yes. Although, it is more than what we expected when we started the process, but it is what we expected as we got further down the road. The design became more complicated, and we started to identify the existing conditions. The vehicle access is going to be improved immensely, but the pedestrian access around EC Best, and all the folks heading north, especially with the Diamond Creek Development, is moving forward with more housing, it is critically important that we get the curb, gutter, and sidewalk there so people can safely walk through that area.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she has heard lots of concerns regarding pedestrian safety from Williams to the Diamond Creek area.

Public Works Director Brian Byrd stated that it is another project to be excited about.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any further comments from Council or public August 16, 2022 Fallon City Council Meeting 7

Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve a construction contract with Herback General Engineering of Minden, Nevada, in order to complete the Sherman Street & North Broadway Street Rehabilitation project, PWP-CH-2022-408, in the amount of Three Million Three Hundred Thousand One Hundred Eighty-Six Dollars and Twenty-Five Cents (\$3,300,186.25), seconded by Councilwoman Frost and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council

#### Fallon Police Department Monthly Report for July, 2022.

Chief of Police Kris Alexander presented the July monthly report.

- Total calls for service were 800.
- Crime Summary Report's highest category continues to be petit larceny. Unfortunately, I would like to point out on the bottom of that category, we did have one domestic-related homicide last month.
- Misdemeanor arrests continue to dominate the category. 9 Relony and Gross Misdemeanor arrests. 2 arrested for Civil Protected Custody and 1 arrested for a Domestic Violence related incident.
- 203 traffic stops resulted in 21 traffic citations being issued.
- 13 public property accidents and 8 private property accidents.
- Animal Control took in 45 County dogs, 42 City dogs, and 6 dogs from Tribal entities.
- Citizen Survey Results were mostly "Very Satisfied". He added that he would like to point out the 1 in the "Dissatisfied" category. This had to do with a parking issue. When our officers arrived on scene the vehicles were no longer on scene, it was an out-of-state plate, and we could not identify who the vehicle belonged to. This also turned into a complaint about her neighbor and was resolved with the officers that were on scene. Comments included that the officers were very concerned and were able to look past the immediate problems and address the bigger situation. The comment stated: Thanks to all officers involved. Kudos to Detective Goodrick who did a fantastic job in answering questions, expressed empathy, and very positive. I would like to point out that all our family's interactions with the Fallon Police Department are very professional and reassuring. Thank you for your protection, service, and communication, it was very kind. Chief Alexander stated that there was an issue with tumbleweeds piling up on a citizen's property, and report of an abandoned vehicle that had already left the area.
- No assistance or lodging was provided.
- No indoctrination trainings took place at NAS Fallon.
- 141 volunteer hours were donated by the Volunteer in Police Services and 29 hours training. Training included, Domestic Violence meeting, VIN inspections, and Fallon Community Day.
- Officers provided services for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade and foot patrol for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Block Party with no incidents. July 15<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> traffic control was provided for fountain dyeing events on Maine Street. Officer Jacobs on July 21<sup>st</sup> had lunch with kids at the Venturacci Park. Sergeant Riley, Detective Goodrick, PSA Melissa Fecht, and the Volunteer in Police Services volunteered their services during the

Social Services Community Day. School supplies were handed out during that very successful event.

• 29 total arrests were made. Of the 8 Felony arrests, 3 of them were warrants. Of the 13 Misdemeanor arrests, 9 were for Misdemeanor warrants. The 3 biggest arrests were for catalytic convertors and 2 were for stolen bicycles.

Councilwoman Frost asked if we could follow up with the person that was having the tumbleweed problem. I know that isn't your department, but could you contact them? I know after the great tumbleweed storm that we had, it was a big problem.

Chief Alexander stated that he would make contact.

Mayor Tedford asked if there were any further comments or questions.

Mayor Tedford led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Tedford inquired if the agenda had been posted in compliance with NRS requirements.

#### **Public Comments**

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were any public comments. He noted that comments are to be general in nature, not relative to any agenda items. Geoff Knell of 261 Serpa Place greeted the Council. Do you see anything offensive to anybody? I would like to read I Peter Chapter 2. It's called Submission to the Government. Councilwoman Kent motioned to approve the accounts payable, payroll and customer deposit warrants; seconded by Councilman Richardson and approved with a 3-0 vote by the Council.

Public hearing for discussion of possible projects to be funded through the Community Development Block Grant Program, for fiscal year 2023-2024.

City Engineer Derek Zimney greeted the Council. The purpose of this public hearing is to give citizens an opportunity to discuss the proposed projects submitted to date and to suggest further ideas. The projects listed will be heard at a third and final hearing, which will be held to discuss, approve, and rank applications prior to submittal to the State. The CDBG Program is administered by the Department of Housing and Urban

Development and is authorized by Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act. The primary objective of the Community Development Block Grant Program is the development of viable communities by providing decent housing, suitable living environments, and expanding economic opportunities principally for persons of low and moderate income. The Governor's Office of Economic Development anticipates the amount of 2023 allocations at \$3,400,000 for rural Nevada. The projects discussed during this public hearing could be eligible for evaluation and ranking by the City Council during the third and final CDBG hearing. A Public Hearing Notice, which was posted on August 23, 2022, included the Kaiser Street Roadway & ADA Improvement Project, Laura Mills Park Improvement Project, South Broadway and South Nevada Street Roadway & ADA Improvement Project, and miscellaneous ADA Improvement and Sidewalk Improvement throughout the City. I have included a map that HUD puts out listing all the high, medium, and low areas. A project has to be located in an area that is greater than 51% LMI. Staff has carefully evaluated the proposed projects and by all of them represent an aid in our community. We started with the Kaiser Street Roadway & ADA project because it is probably our best chance at meeting eligibility and the best chance of being funded. The CDBG project committee is very focused on the LML. We thought this area would be our strongest case.

Mayor Tedford stated that he thinks this is a good project on Kaiser. It has become thoroughfare now because the east west drivers on Williams are using Kaiser when coming from the east west as an alternative to get to businesses and get across town. So, I think this will need to be our number one priority, I think.

Councilwoman Frost stated that she knows Laura Mills Park is probably high on the list and doesn't think that it will fall under the economic portion of the CDBG, but I think that is something we can continue to work on.

Mayor Tedford stated that he thinks that if any of it could fall under the economic development, that would be fine. Maybe we need to push on that part, and maybe do it as an alternative. We could always send 2 projects; I am not opposed to that. We found in our past that sometimes they have money that isn't used, and they ask if we have another project. I always worry about sending 2 projects and not getting any.

Councilwoman Kent asked if it would be the grounds at Laura Mills Park that would be the priority.

Engineer Zimney stated that they have been looking at redoing the asphalt, the grass, the playground equipment. I think all of it needs upgrades.

Councilman Richardson stated that he is for the Kaiser Street project. I don't think I have been down that road in awhile and when I did, it was pretty bad. With all the new businesses that are coming in, it really sticks out with the brand-new landscaping they have, and then you have Kaiser Street. I think it can be tied to economic development esthetically, to have a nice street. I see that Port of Subs is going in over there. I think that overall, it would be good for businesses and maybe people will travel more in that area.

Mayor Tedford stated that when we did Front Street, Humboldt, and Ferguson areas people would comment how it transformed that neighborhood. Kaiser street hasn't been done because we wanted to take the bend out of the street and move all the power poles that are in the sidewalks. If you look at it, it is more than just moving the power pole. There is some infrastructure on the power poles and some drainage issues when we look at taking the bend out.

Mayor Tedford inquired if there were further questions or comments from Council September 6, 2022 Fallon City Council Meeting 3

or the public.

Mr. Geof Knell of 261 Serpa Place greeted the Council. What the government is doing is putting us more in debt and the cost of living is going up. To me, the process it's...it's going to benefit all of us some way or another, but it is putting us in a position where we feel the effects of the money being spent to the federal government, to the state, and they call it a grant. It brings up our operational costs and so forth. It doesn't make sense, and why would you agree with something...it's free, it's not free. It takes away the liberty and freedom of our own choices. Our constituency in the first amendment (inaudible). I understand what you are doin'; is raising the debt, and why we are here today, financially. You better think about what your doin'. Thank you.
